Page Mr. Townes

Councilmen Curry and Kadlecik have introduced resolutions in the city council for better street car service for their constituents.

Kadlecik is asking for four minute service during the day, with two minute schedules during rush hours on the Broadway line. Curry complains that Woodland cars are turned at Luna Park, instead of running to the end of the line.

Their objections will come before the city council committee on street railway next Monday evening and to support their appeal a delegation of residents from the sixteenth ward intend to be present.

We hope the people on the east side get what they want, but how about residents of Brooklyn? Why doesn't Sixth Ward Councilman Townes make a fight before the council's street railway committee? Hundreds of people out Pearl and State roads would cry aloud with joy at the possibility of getting better service to replace the hourly and half hour service they are now getting.

Maybe Councilman Townes isn't to be criticised for not taking some action. Perhaps the people themselves in Brooklyn are not alert enough to start a fight for better service. If they made it known to Councilman Townes in unmistakable terms that they wanted better service and offered to appear as a delegation before the street railway committee, he very likely would offer his co-operation.

Of course, we will admit there would be no harm in Mr. Townes taking the initiative in the matter. Maybe he will.

For a long time the residents out Pearl and State roads have suffered from atrocious street car service. And in view of the agreement which the street railway company made with the residents of the district when it agreed to extend its lines, the street railway corporation has the upper hand.

However, despite all handicaps there is no reason why the people should lose heart in a fight for better service. "Keep hollering and you will get what you want" was the advice a city employee gave to a group of Brooklyn residents in an address recently.

Why not take his advice on the street railway service proposition? If Brooklyn people keep hollering they ought to stand a pretty fair show of getting at least a five cent fare from the Square to the present city limits at Brook Park road.

That better service will come, is inevitable, as the coming growth of the community will eventually demand it. But unless a fight is constantly kept up the improvement of service may not be effected for several more years.

The Brooklyn Parma Royalton Civic Association is constantly fighting for better street car service for Brooklyn. And it is making some headway. Might be a good suggestion for every resident of the community to get behind this organization in its fight.

If the fight is persistent and strenuous enough it will surely result in victory.

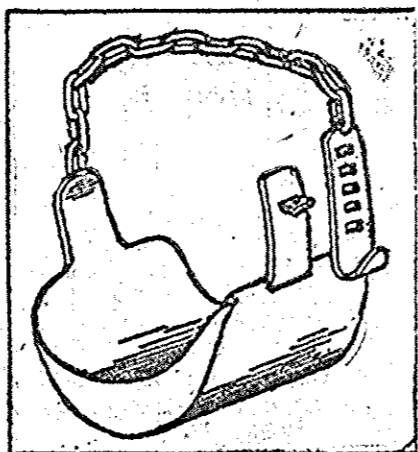

OLD FIFTY-NINER MARVELS AT CITY

RETURNS TO DENVER AND SEES CONDITIONS CHANGED

Handful of Houses Sat Where Sky-scrapers Now Rear Their Heads—Rufus Townbridge Discovers

Denver, Colo.—While the din of a busy city resounded in Denver's downtown district, Rufus Townbridge, 77, sat at a second story window overlooking one of the busiest streets and told of the Denver which he had known as a little village along the banks of Cherry Creek, more than fifty years ago.

Townbridge first saw Denver in 1859 when, in company with other gold seekers he braved the dangers of an unsettled country, where Indians were an ever present menace, hoping to find a fortune in Colorado's newly discovered gold fields. Of the party of seventeen men with which Town-

bridge came west, only he and George Chase of Boulder are now alive.

Townbridge who now makes his home with a daughter in Grand Junction has spent the past few days in Denver and Boulder, comparing the two cities with the tiny settlements he knew in the days of the gold rush, and has recalled many interesting reminiscences of pioneer times.

Townbridge was a youth of 21 when he felt the call of the west and joined a company which was formed in Boone county, Illinois, to cross the plains in prairie schooners drawn by oxen. Many harrowing experiences fell to the lot of men as their caravan crept slowly westward.

But nothing daunted them and when they reached Omaha they decided to outfit for a journey to California and not stop in Colorado. With good luck they could reach the Pacific coast in six months; according to their estimate. When the company arrived at Fort Laramie, Wyo., seventeen men, including Townbridge decided to carry out their original plan and come to the Colorado mining district. They were influenced to change their plans thru statements by Horace Greeley, who had passed thru the fort a few days ahead of them and had told the soldiers that Colorado was the land of opportunity. Accordingly the little party headed south from Fort Laramie to Boulder, the journey occupying more than a week. Boulder, where they arrived about the middle of July, 1859, had about fifty residents at that time and Denver was not much larger.

Many narrow escapes from death at the hands of Indians are recounted by Townbridge. He says that once on a journey from Fort Kearney, Neb., to Fort Laramie, Wyo., the little company with which he was traveling, thirty-five men in all, was attacked by a force of 400 Indians. The Indians first attempted to stampede the oxen, and when they had failed in that, drew firearms and bows and ordered the white men to give up all their belongings. The members of the party showed a disposition to fight and the drivers were told to go ahead. For some reason which the white men could not understand the Indians allowed them to proceed. Townbridge says the Indians had fresh scalps at their belts.

After spending a few years in the West Townbridge returned to Iowa, where he settled down as a farmer. A few years ago he came to Grand Junction, Colo. In spite of his advanced age Townbridge is in vigorous health.

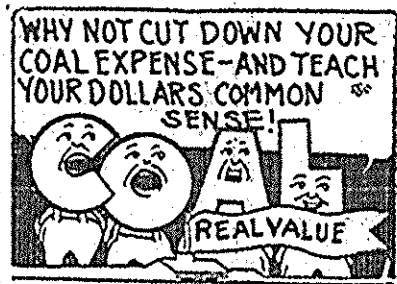

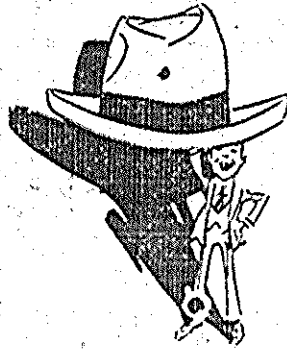

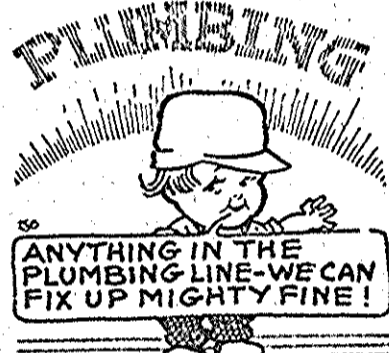
The gymnasium classes for high school girls and young business women were a great success.

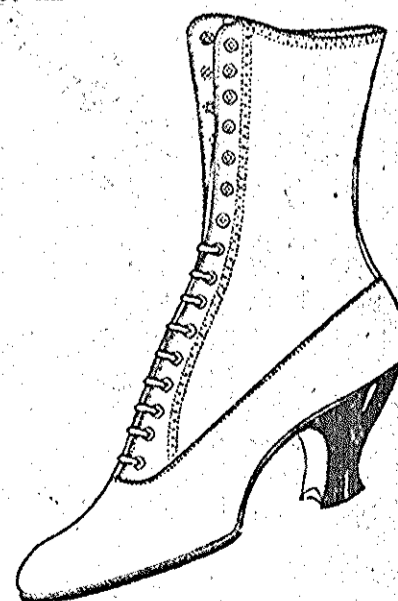
