

If they made it known to Councilman Townes in unmistakable terms that they wanted better service and offered to appear as a delegation before the street railway committee, he very likely would offer his co-operation.

Of course, we will admit there would be no harm in Mr. Townes taking the initiative in the matter. Maybe he will.

For a long time the residents out Pearl and State roads have suffered from atrocious street car service. And in view of the agreement which the street railway company made with the residents of the district when it agreed to extend its lines, the street railway corporation has the upper hand.

Mowever, despite all handicaps there is no reason why the people should lose heart in a fight for better service. "Keep hollering and you will get what you want" was the advice a city employee gave to a group of Brooklyn residents in an address recently.

Why not take his advice on the street railway service proposition? If Brooklyn people keep hollering they ought to stand a pretty fair show of getting at least a five cent fare from the Square to the present city limits at Brook Park road.

That better service will come, is inevitable, as the coming growth of the community will eventually demand it. But unless a fight is constantly kept up the improvement of service may not be effected for several more years.






