SAYS DELI DESERVES EXTREME PUNISHMENT FOR MURDERING WIFE

Joseph Deli, self confessed murderer of his 17 year old bride, Ida Deli, should be made to pay for his crime by electrocution in the opinion of Rev. W. S. Bamford, pastor of the Brooklyn United Presbyterian church.

Rev. Bamford was a witness to the shooting which took place on Jan. 14, on Broadview road, near 22nd street, and was one of the first witnesses called by the state in its case against Deli, now on trial in the criminal court.

"Capital crimes deserve capital punishment" said Rev. Bamford. Any man who will shoot a woman in the back deserves the extreme penalty.

"Murders are becoming too numerous in Cleveland" Rev. Bamford said "and it now is time that a lesson be made of some of our cold blooded murderers."

"It is very probable that Deli, like many of the other murderers, will gain the sympathy of the jury and escape the penalty he deserves" Rev. Bamford stated.

Donald Martin, 4240 West 22nd street and Howard Leich, 2032 Hood avenue, were other witnesses to the shooting who testified at the trial.

Ida Deli was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Juhasz, of West 22nd street, Brooklyn.

COURT DROPS 21 CASES AGAINST CHIROPRACTORS

Charges against twenty-one Cleveland chiropractors, arrested during the last year because they had practiced without permits from the Ohio Board of Medical Examiners, were ordered dismissed Monday by Judge Powell in common pleas court.

The court declared that while chiropractors were compelled by state law to take examinations before the board, the latter could not dictate what college chiropractors should be graduated from. Most of the chiropractors had refused to take the examination of the board because it had ruled that they should be graduates of medical colleges other than the chiropractors' college.

The suit had been brought by the Ohio Chiropractors Association asking an injunction against the board from prosecuting the twenty-one accused Clevelanders. The injunction was granted.

TELLS HOW TO USE LIBRARY

"Many people do not know how to use the public library," says Miss Smith, librarian of the South Brooklyn branch of the Public Library.

"Any resident," explains Miss Smith, "of the City of Cleveland, or any one who is employed or attends school or pays taxes on property within its limits, may borrow books free."

"If a book is not available when asked for, a self-addressed post card order may be left. As soon as the book is available, this card is mailed to the borrower and the book is held for him for forty-eight hours. If it isn't possible for the borrower to call for the book within that time he may request by telephone that it be charged to his number, subject to his call. Reserve post cards are filed in the order in which they are left. They may be purchased from the library for one cent, the cost of postage."

"The library should have something of interest in recreational reading or practical information, for every man, woman and child of reading age in Brooklyn," says Miss Smith. New books in the South Brooklyn Library include:

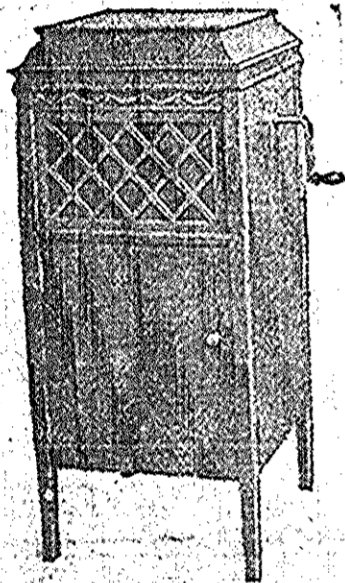

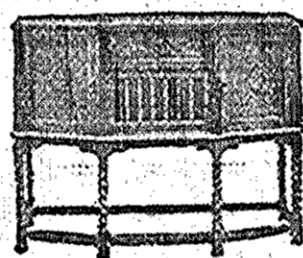

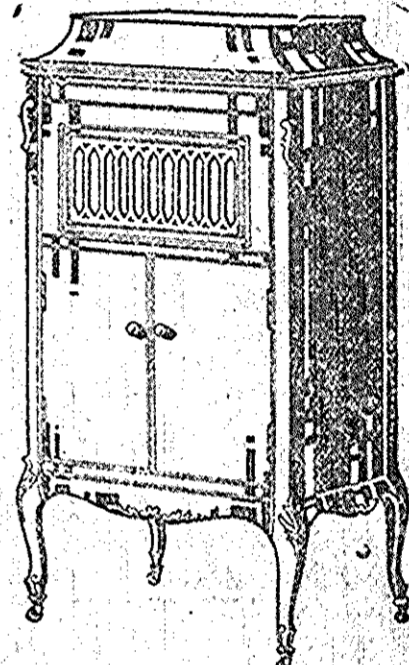
