FIRST GUN SOUNDED FOR B. P. R. MEMBERSHIP DRIVE—GOAL SET FOR 500 MEMBERS BEFORE JUNE 1

The first cannon of the membership campaign of the Brooklyn Parma Royalton Civic association was fired this week when the president, J. P. Smith, announced that an attempt would be made to enroll in the organization every live man interested in the community.

The goal is 500 members by June 1. "There should be no trouble reaching this number," says President Smith. "Considering the great amount of people who own homes in Brooklyn in addition to many others who are interested in Brooklyn's prosperity, there is no reason to think the personnel of the organization cannot reach a figure much greater than 500 before June," says Mr. Smith.

Since its organization the B. P. R. has had only one thing in mind; namely, the welfare of Brooklyn. It has effected many improvements for the community, the greatest of which has

been the establishing of a sanitary sewer district in the county south of South Brooklyn. Had it not been for the B. P. R. activities it is very likely that the district would never have been established by the County Commissioners.

There are dozens of other improvements that the organization wishes to bring about before the year ends that will enhance materially the value of every piece of property in this territory, says President Smith. "We are going to make up for the work that has been neglected during the past three years because of the war," Mr. Smith says. "The war is history and now we want to turn our attention to winning improvements for Brooklyn," he states.

It is the plan to have the membership drive extend into every nook and corner of the community. A committee will be appointed to carry on the work of enrolling new members.

B. P. R. TO MEET MARCH 19

The next meeting of the Brooklyn Parma Royalton Civic Association will be next Friday evening, March 19 in Odd Fellows' hall.

There will be a general discussion of matters pertaining to the future of the organization.

MARSH CO. IS INCORPORATED; TO SELL STOCK

The Marsh Motor Car Co., located at Ridge road and the Cleveland Belt Line Railway, has just been incorporated for \$2,000,000 and will offer at once a million dollars of 7 per cent cumulative preferred stock to the public.

The par value of the stock will be \$100 and it will be retirable at \$105. A share of no par common stock will accompany each share of preferred and when the preferred stock is retired the common stock will automatically take its place.

The fiscal agent who will handle the sale of the stock will be announced in a few days. "Every share of stock is backed either by assets or cash," announces Mr. Crowley, legal adviser for the company.

The first Marsh automobile is now being tested on Ridge road. Because of the hilly condition of the highway, Ridge road is held to be a first class place for trying out a new car.

The Marsh company is receiving inquiries relative to placing orders for the new Marsh automobile from dealers in all parts of the world and officials of the company anticipate a demand that will always far exceed the supply.

Within the next two weeks the Marsh company expects to have its foundry in operation. Construction of other buildings is being rapidly pushed.

The Marsh Motor Car Co. has closed up its offices in the Cleveland hotel and will now do all of its business from the factory offices.

Home Savings & Trust Company stock has been listed on the Cleveland Exchange. The bank was organized in 1902. The stock consists of \$125,000 in \$100 shares, which have paid dividends at the rate of 6 per cent. The company's statement shows surplus of \$85,000 and undivided profits of \$53,860.

MAKE RICH GERMANS MOAN

Heavy Taxes Cut Deeply Into Fortunes of the Wealthy Hun. The lot of the multibillionaire in Germany will be a hard one under the new emergency levy and income and inheritance taxes. Dr. Felix Pinner, financial writer of the Berlin Tageblatt, estimates that under these taxes a German industrial fortune of 10,000,000 marks would be reduced by 1925 to 3,114,000 marks. This would mean that the state had taken nearly 7,000,000 marks by various forms of taxation designed to solve the tremendous financial problem which Germany faces.

If the owner of this fortune were to die, say in 1925, and should leave one son, the son would have to pay to the state as inheritance tax 1,289,000 marks.

The Tageblatt's commentator points out that this would be insufficient to continue an industry which in peace times had required a capital of 7,000,000 marks, and that this operation would weaken the productive power of industrial concerns by over-severe liquidation of their wealth. "The high capital taxes will saw off the limb upon which income and industrial taxes should sit," concludes Dr. Pinner.

CLAIM RIGHT TO STEAL

Berlin Servants Insist on Privileges Under Bolshevik Order.

The bolshevik idea that the other fellow ought to be compelled to share his property even if one must resort to theft to obtain it seems to actuate some of Berlin's thieves.

Two sisters, servants of a well-to-do family in Hanover, who recently stole \$300,000 worth of valuables from their employers, declared, when arrested, that they felt it was perfectly right, under the new order of things to take a share in the property of those better situated.

Large quantities of jewelry and valuable articles are being stolen in Berlin. Servants are often the offenders and frequently are captured because they are amateurs.

SHOULD STICK TO LAW

Connecticut Hodcarrier Evidently Was "Cut Out" for the Profession.

James O'Brien, hodcarrier by profession, lawyer by inclination, won his suit at Hartford, Conn., after "lifting" his expensive legal talent and arguing his own case.

O'Brien, who waits from Astoria, N. Y., won a United States court judgment against Walter Lawyer of Bridgeport, president of the American Chain company, and other millionaires, in an action growing out of a set of recidivisms.

The first day the action came to trial the court became tangled up over procedure. The lawyers could not find a way out, but O'Brien chipped up with the rule covering the case and then everything went well. Immediately afterward the hodcarrier "fired" his attorney and with the assistance of the judge, argued his case to a successful conclusion.

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Dancing Craze Affects Scotland.

The dancing craze has reached such proportions, even in sober Scotland, that it came up before the Inverness magistrates. Bailie Petrie, who favored restriction before, said he would not now oppose dancing to four o'clock in the morning, because after considering the question, he considered the evils which he had in view were not the direct outcome of those dances.

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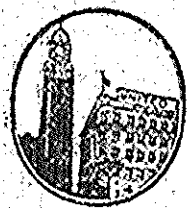
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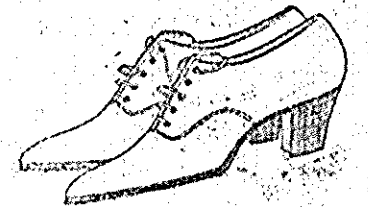
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SAYS CONGRESS WASTES MONEY TIME AND PUBLIC'S INTEREST
