## ROAD IMPROVEMENTS DISCUSSED BY B. P. R. - COMMISSIONERS ARE CRITICISED FOR THEIR INACTIVITY

Highway improvements, tension of water and sewer systems county planning commission, and general discussion of needed improvements in the South Brooklyn territory were among the chief features of last meeting of the Brooklyn Par-Royalton Civic Association.

The meeting, which was held last Friday evening, was one of the most interesting the organization held this year.

In the course of the session the county commissioners came in an amount of criticism for their inattention toward needed improvements in South Brooklyn territory.

Praises Membership Drive

The plan of conducting a membership campaign was discussed at the meeting by President Smith who announced that the B. P. R. would have its new headquarters in Room 2111, 11th block. The membership drive will start soon—the goal being 500 members by June 1.

Pleasant valley road is one highway which the B. P. R. is anxious to have improved with paving and a meeting President Smith announced he would have a committee call the county commissioners to insist action. The matter of paving Pleasant Valley road has been considered for some time but various things have been happening to delay the need improvement. It is the B. P. R.'s intention to go before the commissioners and insist that something be done to overcome the few existing obstacles and that paving be started.

The proposition of extending Settlement road and Spokane avenue were also discussed and President Smith planning on taking action on the matters.

Shows Need of Improvements

It was during the discussion of water and sewer extensions that the commissioners came in for a scolding. August Sherman, builder and allotment operator on State road, said lack of water and sewer facilities were resulting in the erection of Bailey.

This was the intention of those of us who were its organizers back in 1914, feeling it was not only better for the organization but it was an injustice to the individual to expect him to neglect his personal business from year to year for that of the public.

For the past two years it has been impossible for me to devote the amount of time to the office of secretary that that office required there for the work has been more or less neglected and I have only held onto the very urgent request of my associates who helped organize the Association and then only with the understanding that it was only until someone was found to carry on the work as it should be done.

That time has now arrived, we fully believe. The change was discussed at the last executive board meeting held March 5th and my resignation as secretary is therefore now tendered the association to become effective at once.

All who have been closely associated with me in our work in the past know my dream has always been to see the B. P. R. Civic Association one of the strongest and best in this city. It can be done.

The time is ripe to make this dream come true but it means intensive work for the secretary's office.

I have spent many pleasant hours in my work and in the future when the association has become a great power for good in the community it will always be a profound joy to feel that I have had some small measure in the success in its pioneer days.

It is with the very best of wishes that I turn over the office to my successor.

Five thousand or more have enjoyed these summer outings, have fished, swam, engaged in all kinds of athletics and games, formed friendships that have lasted a lifetime, and have come home tanned and happy and better fitted for the winter's work because of their days in camp.

Life decisions have been made, out there on the rocks, under the stars, hundreds of boys have sat and looked into camp fires and have seen more than burning wood and coals, and a first generation of campers are now sending their sons to the camp. All this; and yet the camp has never been given a proper name. It has always been "The Farm," "The Y Camp," "Centerville Mills," "The Camp," "The Reservation" or whatever name suited the fancy of the particular group of campers or branch of the association.

Now it has been decided that the camp is to be christened with a real, honest-to-goodness name, and it is going to be done in this way: All the old campers, prospective campers and their friends are to be given an opportunity to suggest a proper name.

Brooklyn boys may turn in any name which they desire to suggest at the office of the Y. M. C. A., 3327 Broadway, no later than Saturday, April 3.

If a boy suggests a name that is finally chosen he will be given a period in camp this summer in addition to the honor of having named the "Y" camp.

## Start Camp Thrift Club.

The Brooklyn Y. M. C. A., co-operating with the Broadview Savings & Loan Co., is promoting a thrift club whereby boys who wish to go to camp with the Brooklyn Y. M. C. A. may save all or part of the cost. Any boy expecting to go to camp may make payment of 25 cents or more at any time at the office of the Y. M. C. A., 3327 Broadway. He receives a pass book in which all his deposits are entered. If a boy expects to save the entire camp fee, which is \$8.00, he must deposit 50 cents a week for the sixteen weeks which will elapse before camp time.

All Brooklyn boys interested in camp are urged to take out a camp account. All money deposited will be returned in August 1st if a boy is unable to go to camp.

 But just wait, there will be another election soon that will likely make some commissioners sit up and take notice. What the people out this way want is not squabbling as the result of different political complexions—but Results.

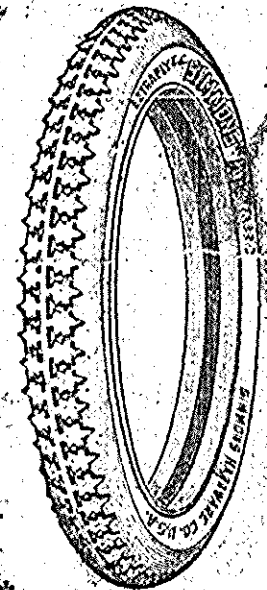
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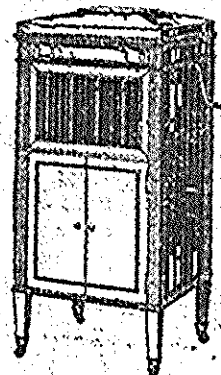
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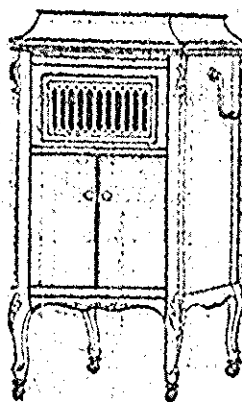
