100,000 PEOPLE IN CITY WHO CAN'T SPEAK U. S. LANGUAGE—SAYS WILES

The quarterly convention of the Cuyahoga county W. C. T. U. was held last Tuesday in Pearl Road M. E. Church. Mrs. Emily Warner, president, was in charge. The Pearl Union entertained. Mrs. Eben Fish, president of Pearl Union, was not able to be present to conduct devotional services, because of ill health.

In giving her report, Mrs. E. S. Loomis, secretary, said: "Congress sets aside annually \$4,211,000 for care of live stock, mostly pigs, and only \$268,000 for child welfare. If a farmer's hogs are afflicted with cholera, the government will immediately send experts to check the disease, but with human life it is different," she asserted.

E. P. Wiles, director of Americanization work in Cleveland, said "the only way to stop Bolshevism is to get at the prey the leaders feed upon, and that is the great mass of ignorant people; and not all of them are foreign born either," he said. "There is," he continued, "only one way to do it properly and that is by the slow process of education in the language of America—English. There are 100,000 people in Cleveland who can't speak the 'U. S.' language."

Miss Helen Tuttle, of the International Institute Association, made a plea for educated workers for Americanization work.

Mrs. R. B. Hauserman, W. C. T. U. state superintendent said "There's work for every woman who wants to lend a hand."

LITTLE LUMBER PROBLEM COULDN'T STALL A FELLOW LIKE W. T. MARSH

The Foundry at the Marsh Motor Car Company's plant, at Ridge road and the Belt line has been completed and will soon be engaged in turning out parts for Marsh cars. Other buildings are being rushed to completion.

Compilation of records show that it required 150 freight cars to move equipment from the former Marsh munition plant at Brockton, Mass., to the Ridge Road factory. The freight charges for shipping the machinery approximated \$40,000.

One unusual incident that marked the erection of the first unit of the Marsh plant was that while the roofing timber was being placed on one portion of the building wood shoppers were busy in the Massachusetts forests felling the trees to be sawed and rushed to complete the rest of the building.

When W. T. Marsh bought the Ridge Road site he was told he would have a difficult time in getting lumber. He overcame this obstacle by going back to Massachusetts and purchasing a timberland.

As might have been expected "Stumbling-block" Kohler argued against almost everything advanced for hastening the paving of Pleasant Valley road.
But despite Kohler's oppositions the B. P. R. road committee was able to convince the other two county commissioners—Andrews and Menning—of the need of taking favorable action that would lead to the paving of Pleasant Valley road. Thanks to the earnest work of the B. P. R. committee and to Menning and Andrews.
If Kohler thinks his high-horsed tactics will ever make him mayor of Cleveland, or land him any other elective office, he has the wrong dope. The people are getting tired of his "grandstanding."

Give Us A Slice

Now it is up to Brooklyn to go after the school board for a slice of that \$20,000,000 which the board is asking to be raised through bonds for the erection of more schools in Cleveland.
Every community in Cleveland needs more school rooms but few if any need them worse than Brooklyn. Conditions in Brooklyn, especially at the Dawning school, where the children are cramped for room, need immediate relief.
The school board cries "no money" when asked why the long promised Spring Road school is not being built. No doubt its cry is true. But if \$20,000,000 is voted for school building, Brooklyn people should make a loud enough noise to get at least enough for building on the Spring road school site.
