## BUY SITE TO MAKE "LEATHER"

Forty acres of land at Broadview and Brook Park roads have been purchased by the United States Leather Co., for the purpose of erecting a factory to manufacture a leather product from waste materials. United States Leather is incorporated for \$10,500,000 and is under the control of the E. B. Cassatt Co., Society for Savings Building.

Erection of the factory will start soon, say officials of the Cassatt Co. The product will be called Bisons leather, claimed to be water and weather proof, wear resisting and stronger than genuine leather.

The proposed factory site is equipped with belt line facilities.

## B. B. R. AND B. P. R. TO DISCUSS CONSOLIDATION THIS EVENING

Consolidation of the Brooklyn Parma Royalton Civic Association and The Brooklyn Business Chamber will be discussed at the joint meeting of the two organizations this evening (Friday), in old Odd Fellows' Hall.

The meeting is to start at 8 o'clock. Unless all present predictions miscarry consolidation of the two organizations will be effected at this evening's meeting.

The members of both organizations have expressed themselves as being in favor of getting together. They say that it will mean greater co-operation for the general welfare of the entire community.

E. A. Roberts, secretary of the Cleveland Builders' Exchange, will speak on "Co-operation."

Every man interested in the welfare of Brooklyn and adjacent territory is asked to attend the meeting.

If consolidation can be effected on terms that are entirely satisfactory to both the members of The Brooklyn Business Chamber and the Brooklyn Parma Royalton Civic Association, I, for one, say that the consolidation should be effected," says J. Elsoffer, head of the Business Chamber.

Mr. Elsoffer is ill and will not be able to attend the meeting. He has been confined to his home for over a week.

J. P. Smith, president of the B. P. R., always has been interested in consolidation of the two potential organizations. The two organizations combined into one would give this community a working force greater than that of any other part of the city or county. The community wants to accomplish big things in the near future, therefore unity of forces is essential for effective work," says Mr. Smith.

Besides the consolidation there will be many other things to be discussed. It is expected that the sewer and street committees will be among those to have something of interest to tell. The address by Mr. Roberts alone should be a drawing card. Mr. Roberts is a speaker—the kind that it does one good to hear.

From all indications this evening's meeting will be a big one.

While every indication points to a consolidation of the Brooklyn Parma Royalton Civic Association and the Brooklyn Business Chamber, there exists a chance between the cup and the lip that may cause plans to go awry.

The Brooklyn News believes that the two organizations should get together. It is folly for two potent bodies as the B. B. C. and the B. P. R. to stay apart when much more can be accomplished by unity.

Two organizations do not make for efficiency. Two organizations with practically the same purpose—the welfare of the community—result in wasted effort. Unorganization is one of the causes of Brooklyn's backwardness in improvements. The existence of two associations striving toward the same goal is not organization as far as the general community is concerned.

At the meeting this evening both organizations should be willing to make concessions if concessions are necessary. The time has passed for pettiness. Both organizations should go into consolidation with full confidence that consolidation will be beneficial to each organization. Faith is just as essential in an organization as in religion and faith in the other organization's intentions is necessary for effective permanent consolidation.

The Brooklyn News believes that proper consolidation of the B. P. R. and the B. B. C. assures the Brooklyn community one of the strongest civic organizations in Cleveland, outside the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce.

**BODY WORKS FOR BROOK PARK ROAD**

Another factory is locating on Brook Park road, between Pearl and State roads.

The new factory will manufacture automobile bodies and is being erected by the James Holan Manufacturing Co., which now has a factory employing 150 men at 3809 Clark Ave.

Excavation has started on the Brook Park factory and it is expected to have it completed in six weeks. A mill and a dry kiln will be erected on Brook Park road and the approximate expenditure will be \$100,000, says Mr. Holan.

It is the plan to enlarge the factory with more buildings next year. The Clark avenue factory will be continued in co-operation with the proposed Brook Park plant. The Brook Park factory is being erected on the north side of Brook Park road a short distance east of Pearl road.
