## B. P. R. AND B. B. C. CONSOLIDATE INTO ONE POWERFUL ASSOCIATION TO SERVE THIS ENTIRE TERRITORY

"To promote the general welfare of the people of the Southwestern district of Cuyahoga county; to develop an interest in civic and governmental affairs, and to adopt a constructive program for the purpose of improving the general well being of this district."

—this is the purpose of the newly organized Southwestern Civic and Business Men's association as set forth in the by-laws of the organization.

The Southwestern Civic and Business Men's Association is the result of the consolidation of the Brooklyn Parma Royalton Civic Association and The Brooklyn Business Chamber which took place last Friday evening at a meeting of the members of the two old organizations.

With the consolidation the two parent organizations—the B. P. R. and the B. B. C. pass into history.

At the consolidation meeting officers for the Southwestern association were elected as follows:

President, J. P. Smith; vice president, B. F. Blaser; treasurer, J. H. Rosenberg; secretary, L. E. Fruch.

Mr. Smith was the president of the B. P. R. Mr. Rosenberg was the secretary of the B. B. C. Mr. Blaser and Mr. Fruch held similar offices in the B. P. R.

The consolidation gives Brooklyn and adjacent territory one of the most powerful organizations to be found in any community in the county. The Southwestern will by no means limit its activities to one place in its community, but to the entire community.

"The consolidation is the stepping stone to achievement of improvements in the Southwestern part of the county," said President Smith after the consolidation was effected. "Instead of two organizations in this great developing community we now have one powerful organization which will mean efficiency and saving of energies."

### ROBERTS TELLS WHAT ALL ORGANIZATIONS NEED

Before the vote was taken on consolidation of the B. B. C. and the B. P. R., E. A. Roberts, secretary of the Cleveland Builders Exchange told what was necessary for effective organization.

"A civic organization to be a good organization must be composed of members who are willing to give of their time and money," said Mr. Roberts. He said it was the duty of a member of any organization to pay his dues and attend the meetings.

The speaker told what was accomplished by the Builders' Exchange through organization and what organization did for the village of East Cleveland in the way of getting improvements.

### NO TIME LOST IN GETTING DOWN TO WORK.

As soon as the consolidation was effected the Southwestern Civic and Business Men's association got down to business.

### Express delivery.

The matter of obtaining free express delivery for the people of Brooklyn was brought before the association. It was pointed out that other communities farther from the public square than Brooklyn were getting free express service. For nearly a year an effort to get free express service has been under way without results. President Smith appointed a committee consisting of J. H. Rosenberg, Councilman Townes, Ed Edelman and W. B. McDiarmid to take up the matter and report back at the next meeting.

G. H. Arndt, plumber told the association that the installation of water and sewer connections in streets after the paving had been laid was responsible for the bad condition of many of the city's thoroughfares. He urged the association to do whatever it could to educate the public that the time to install water and sewer lines was before streets are improved.

### TELLS OF PLANS OF MARSH COMPANY.

What was being done at the Marsh automobile plant was told by a representative of the Krause-Williams Co., fiscal agents for the Marsh Motor Co.'s stock issue. The representative said that everything pointed to the success of the Marsh Company and that the institution meant the beginning of a tremendous industrial development for Brooklyn community.

The Marsh Company is receiving visitors to its plant. Last Sunday nearly a thousand people were shown through the institution.

### MORE DEFINITE THAN THE OUIJA BOARD.

It is the plan of the Southwestern Association to invite the planning commissioners to speak at a community mass meeting at a later date. The commission has many plans for improving the Brooklyn Community that are sure to be of interest to every property owner.

## WARM WEATHER STARTS ACTION ON 1920 BROOKLYN DAY PLANS

The committee appointed by President Smith consists of George Mey-Pythis and the Masonic fraternity, chairman; Ed Edelman and W. B. McDiarmid.

## THIEVES LOOT TOMATO GARDEN; WALK OFF WITH 600 PLANTS

A dozen years ago when it took only 50 or 75 cents to buy a good cap, no one ever would have thought of stealing such a trifling thing as a tomato or a cabbage plant.

But times have changed. Along with everything else, tomato, cabbage, pepper and other plants have gone towards the sky in price and as the result have become objects much coveted by thieves.

In the last few weeks reports have been coming from various parts of the county of vegetable plant robbers. The latest to be reported was the theft of 600 plants from the garden of Peter Knutzen of Brookpark road, opposite Stump road last Saturday night. Mr. Knutzen had just completed planting 1,000 tomato plants last Saturday afternoon and when he went to his garden Sunday morning he discovered he had been robbed of 600 of the plants. The foot prints of two men and a dog were plainly visible in the soft earth.

Because of the many plant thefts some growers are reported to be taking special precautions to guard their gardens.

A year ago the Knutzen home was robbed of clothes and considerable jewelry.

All are invited of the family from the oldest to the youngest. In the evening at 8 o'clock the subject of the sermon will be, "A Day in the Life of Jesus."

## Beautiful Martinique.

Martinique, where 18 years ago occurred one of the worst volcanic disasters that human history has ever known, is one of the important islands of the West Indies retained by France in the desperate fighting for their possession. The capital, Fort-de-France, is an amazingly picturesque town at the head of a beautiful bay. Tourists have been prompted to term Martinique an ideal paradise. It is a lotus land of perpetual summer, with an endless variety of highlands and lowlands. Martinique also has the serpent of Eden, the dreaded fer de lance, which is the only poisonous snake found on any of the islands north of Trinidad. It sometimes grows to a length of six feet, is quick and powerful, and its poison works almost instantaneously.

## Sugar Mills Making Saltpeper.

In the sugar factory at Pecty, Bohemia, successful experiments have been made with the manufacture of saltpeper from the waste liquids of the mill. It is calculated that under normal conditions the beet sugar factories of Czecho-Slovakia will produce 6,000 to 7,000 tons of saltpeper annually. This quantity is considered sufficient for the production of explosives. In Prague a corporation capitalized at 15,000,000 crowns has been organized to manufacture explosives under a permit of the government. The factory will be located at Pardubice, but the offices of the corporation will be at Prague.

## DUE RESPECT TO BE PAID WAR HEROES BY BROOKLYN PEOPLE

Brooklyn will pay proper respect to all war heroes.

All the stores in the community will be closed all day Monday in honor of Memorial Day.

Last week the dry goods, shoe and men's furnishing stores announced they would close all day Monday and immediately afterwards came the report from the grocers and butchers that they, too, would be closed the entire day.

Some of the clubs and fraternal organizations in the community have arranged to hold special Memorial Day exercises.

## BEGIN TO SEE BETTER SERVICE

Residents out Pearl road begin to see the approach of better street car service since the Cleveland Street Railway Co. has asked the county commissioners for permission to lay tracks in Ridge road, from Pearl road to Bean road. It is believed that the Ridge road line will be tapping a profitable territory for the street railway company, increasing the income of the Pearl road line sufficiently to justify more frequent running of cars.

The street car committee of the Southwestern Civic and Business Men's association is working for improved service on State road. It is endeavoring to eliminate the necessity of passengers having to walk through the street car barns to take a West 35th street car. It also is asking the street railway company to erect a shelter house on State road near Cypress Ave. to protect the people waiting to catch the State road dinky.

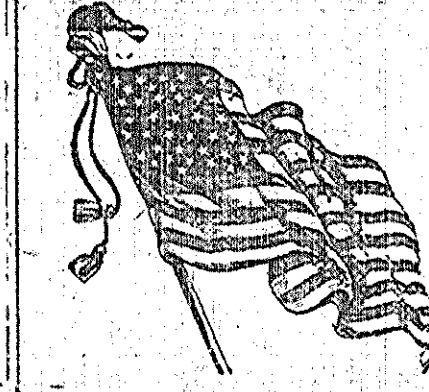
## To Close May 31

**Now For Action!**

The Southwestern Civic and Business Men's Association should soon grow to become the greatest community organization in Cuyahoga county.

The organization has behind it the material for the making of a powerful association. It represents influential men in all walks of life identified with some of the city's foremost industrial, financial and governmental affairs. Because of their important connections these men can make the powers that be turn their attention to the needs of Brooklyn and of all Southwestern Cuyahoga county.

Great strides for the development of this community have been made in the past 12 months, the greatest of all being the establishment of a sanitary sewer district in Parma, Independence, Middleburg and Brooklyn Townships. Engineering experts who have been selected by the county to devise plans for developing the sewer district will make their reports to the county commissioners early in June.

Many other improvements besides the sewer district have been accomplished. Street car service has been extended and more street car lines are to be constructed very soon. Water lines, also, have been extended out Pearl and State roads, to Brook Park road and across Brook Park road. High tension lines have been instituted to carry current to the Belt Line factory district.

But these are only a drop in a bucket in comparison to the improvements which Brooklyn and adjacent territory must have, and have as quickly as they can be provided. New sewers must be constructed in Brooklyn as soon as possible. The city engineering department is working on sewer plans and it is up to the Southwestern Association to see that no time is lost in the development of these plans. The street car service out Pearl and State roads needs a 100 per cent improvement. Dozens of Brooklyn streets must be put in passable shape. Schools must be provided for proper education of Brooklyn's younger generation. And many other improvements must be effected to make the community served by Southwestern Civic and Business Men's Association the kind of a community it should be.

The B. P. R. and the B. E. C. consolidation committee did quick work in drafting the by-laws for the new Southwestern Civic and Business Men's Association. Thanks to Attorney Gus Rosenberg, for it was he who framed the by-laws, making it possible for the committee to complete its work with such rapidity.

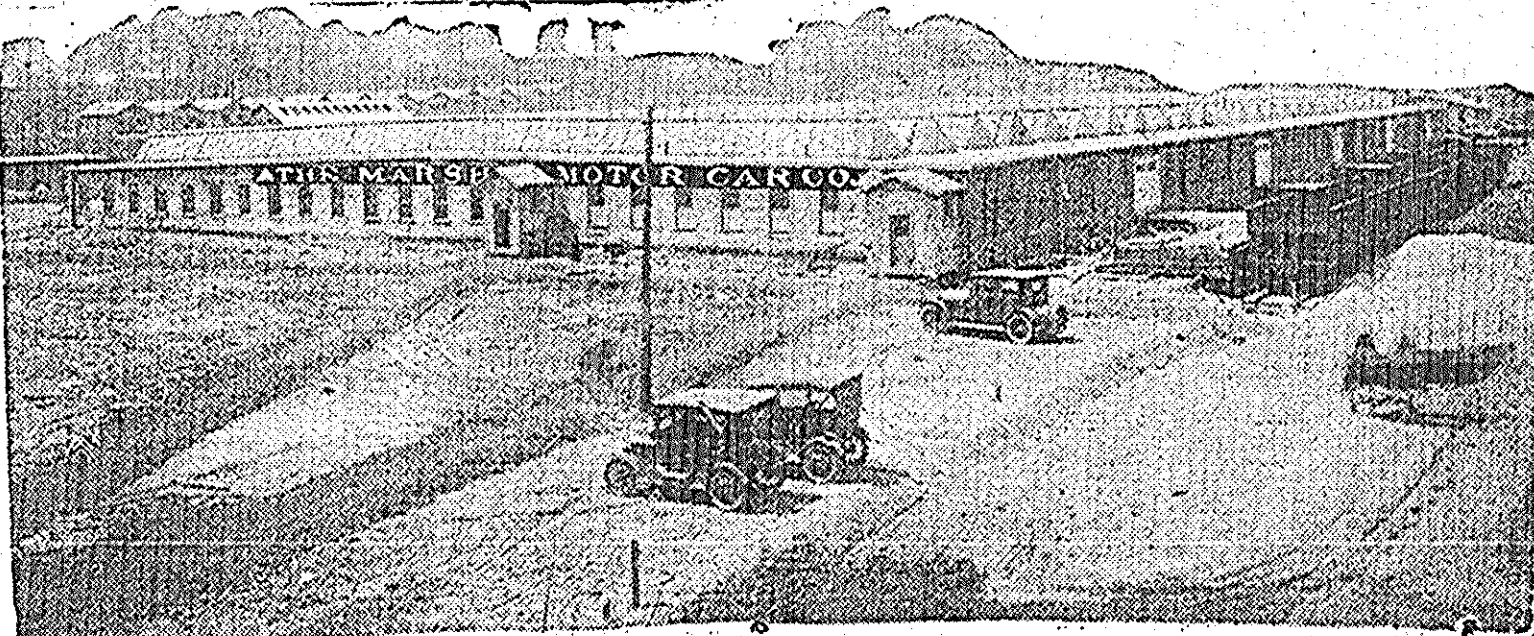
