ROYALTON MAY HAVE ELECTRIC LIGHTS IF IT RAISES \$15,000

The residents of Royalton may have electric lights if they finance the extension of an electric current line from the present terminal at Pearl and Ridge roads to Royalton.

This is what W. F. Rader, of the Cleveland Electric Illuminating Co. told the secretary of the Southwestern Civic and Business Men's Association.

Mr. Rader said to finance the extension to Royalton would require about \$15,000. For every consumer

that is attached to the line a refund of about \$20 would be made to those who financed the line. In time, said Mr. Rader, the financiers would get back about 60 per cent of the amount they advanced.

A line to Royalton would provide current for residents all along the line.

"The Illuminating Co. is making no extensions unless they are financed by those seeking the extension," says Mr. Rader.

WILBERITE CO.'S BUSINESS GROWS

The Wilberite Roofing Co. on Brookpark road, near State road, for the last three months has been enjoying capacity business. Orders have been coming in faster than they can be handled and the shipment during last May approximated \$60,000.

To provide for the demand the Wilberite Company is installing another machine which will increase the concerns capacity 2,500 squares of roofing per day. The company expects before Spring 1921 to have a capacity of 7,500 squares per day.

The Wilberite Company is the only roll roofing factory in Cleveland. Its product includes all kinds of roll rubber roofing; red and green slate surfaced roll roofing; Asphalt house lining for sheeting under weather boards; asphalt specification felt for flat roofs for warehouses, etc.; also a line of insulation materials for refrigeration work.

The Wilberite Co. employs 60 men and when its new building is completed expects to employ 100 men. The company's product is handled by most all jobbers and retail lumber dealers in Cleveland.

CITY PLANNERS TELL OF PLANS FOR COMMUNITY

Brooklyn will have the second community center in Cleveland if the plans of the city planning commission do not miscarry.

The first center to be created will be at Collinwood.

Community center means the centralization of all important community activities, such as public markets, libraries, high school, public bath house, etc.

At the last meeting of the executive board of the Southwestern Civic and Business Men's association, Mr. Whitten, advisor to the city planning commission, and Engineer Conley and Architect Beiner, members of Mr. Whitten's staff, told of some of the tentative plans that were being considered for a community center for Brooklyn.

It is the belief at present that the "Y" forms the best place about which to evolve a community center.

The commissioners have other things in mind for Brooklyn, such as straightening and extending Memphis Ave. to Broadview road, widening main thoroughfares and establishing a building line.

As a result of the Plan Commission activities there is now before the city council committee an ordinance providing a building line. Among other things the ordinance would require that homes be built a certain distance back from the street, so as to provide a uniform line.

If the plans of the Plan Commission carry certain sections will be devoted to commercial purposes and others to residences. It is the commission's intention to prohibit the erection of small stores, here and there, in residence sections.

Following Mr. Whitten's talk the board passed a resolution approving the ordinance submitted to the council committee providing for the fixing of a building line throughout the city.

The board acted also to take the members of the city plan commission, on a tour throughout the southwestern section of the county. The commission is anxious to make a study of its entire community and a trip gave them an opportunity to do so.

GIVE GRANT FOR RIDGE ROAD CAR LINE EXTENSION

The county commissioners last Wednesday granted the franchise for extending its service in Ridge road, from Pearl road to the Bean road.

Application for the franchise was made by Cleveland Railway company. The grant is left 1944.

The grant provides that the railway company shall lay its westerly track from Pearl road to Bean road within six months after the grant is accepted and upon its completion shall immediately operate cars. When business requires the line must be double tracked, according to the grant. The first track will be laid along the westerly side of the pavement.

"The rate of fare between any two points on this extension and any point on the company's railway in Pearl road south of Cypress ave., in either direction, shall be five cents per passenger, without transfer," reads the grant.

The grant requires the running of cars every half hours from 5:30 a. m. to 11:30 p. m.

RESOLUTION TO WHIP OFFENDING SUBDIVIDERS INTO LINE AWAITS "OK" OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

The county commissioners have now before them a resolution prepared by the county prosecutor seeking to prohibit the expenditure of any public funds on the improvement of any allotments in the county that have not been properly laid out and approved by the county.

The resolution is the result of the activities of County Engineer Stinchcomb and the Southwestern Civic and Business Men's Association. Both Mr. Stinchcomb and the association have appealed to the commissioners to take action to prevent the improper allotting of subdivisions.

The measure is intended both to protect the homeseite buyer and to bring about a proper development of the county. The resolution, which has been deferred by the commissioners until another meeting for action, is as follows:

RESOLUTION

For the recording of notice relative to public improvements on proposed highways not dedicated in allotments or sub-divisions.

Whereas, this board of county commissioners, on October 11th, 1916, adopted rules and regulations controlling the dedication of new streets in allotments and sub-divisions in unincorporated territory within Cuyahoga county, and

Whereas, it now comes to the attention of this board that some property owners and subdividers are not complying with the rules and regulations governing such sub-divisions, and are selling lots on proposed streets which have not been laid out or improved in conformity with said rules and regulations;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the board of County Commissioners of Cuyahoga county, O., that the county surveyor be requested from time to time, as he has knowledge thereof, to bring to the attention of this board, the names of those property owners who have sub-divided or are sub-dividing their land and who have laid out proposed streets or public highways therein, and in so doing, have not complied with the rules and regulations adopted by this board governing such subdivisions and it is the intention of this board, when it shall have received such notice, to adopt a notice and have the same recorded in the county records in the county recorder's office, calling attention to the fact that such rules and regulations of this board have not been complied with in the platting of said sub-division and the streets have not been properly dedicated and accepted, and that therefore, no public

funds will be expended for the improvement of any part thereof or on any lands embraced in such subdivision, nor shall sewer or water connections be made therewith until said streets shall have been properly dedicated and the rules and regulations adopted by this board shall have been complied with, relative to the platting of the allotment of such real estate and the proposed streets and highways therein.

Be it further resolved, that in the event said regulations and rules be thereafter complied with by said owners or sub-divisions, this board of county commissioners will cause to be recorded with the county recorder, a certificate reciting such fact, the legal effect of which shall be to release and discharge said premises from all the lien or cloud created by recording of the notice in the first instance.

AUPING PRAISES ACTION BY COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

Allotment developers, who are anxious that homeseite buyers be protected and that the county be properly developed, are praising the proposed action of the commissioners to bring about the proper allotting of subdivisions.

"I believe it is a great move and I for one shall see that the allotments I offer for sale conform entirely to the rules of the county," O. O. Auping told County Engineer Stinchcomb. Mr. Auping is offering for sale lots in Auping Garden Annex on State road at Northland avenue. He presented his plat to the county early this week for approval.

And a Good Time Was Had by all Present

The aroma of the Havanas still lingers in my clothes and the affectionate appeal of County Commissioner Andrews, who overshadowed Senator Harding's "stand by me boys" speech, still rings in my ears as I grind out this story on my Corona.

I still can hear Commissioner's Clerk Krause eating a second portion of fowl and the merry "Ha, Ha" of C. H. Miller who split his sides laughing at County Engineer's Stinchcomb's funny Irish stories, echoes in my ears.

And the sticardo of Herman Gellman's shoes as he ran around the festive board serving the buttermilk which has made Broadview road famous, still rebounds in my head.

In fact, nothing went on that I missed. I was in the midst of it all. To the left of me were the quiet and likeable Rosenbergs, Attorney Gus and Merchant Henry, and to the right was "Mack", occasionally called McDiarmid. Over the stack of chicken in front of me I could catch glimpses of the sunny-jim-faced Pat McNerney, and also the countenance of George Meyers, who as usual left his tact on the hall rack and insisted on telling family secrets.

A little further to the left was anchored A. E. Riester, who said little, evidently worrying that all the "Kids" would become college pros leaving no one to lay bricks or make sheet metal products.

And at the head of the board was "Tony" Howe, who hurried back from a slivvering trip along the Mississippi where he could make good the damage done by the rest of the bunch.

All of this happened at the club house of Fritz Miller on Broadview road. The occasion was a dinner given

to the executive board of the Southwestern Civic and Business Men's Association, to the County Commissioners, to the Metropolitan Park board, to the City Plan Commission, to the engineers who reported on the sanitary sewer districts and other potentates. And as afore intimated, Mr. Howe stood the bill.

The dinner was preceded by a 50-mile tour throughout the entire Southwestern section of Cleveland and Cuyahoga county. The primary purpose of the tour was to get the city plan commission and other officials acquainted with this community.

After the dinner various officials gave short addresses and it was here that Commissioner Andrews made his appeal for co-operation to make Cuyahoga county the best county in the country. Commissioner Andrews pointed out that the development of the two sanitary sewer districts established in the county was a tremendous task and required the co-operation of Cleveland, county and villages and of the residents in the districts. He said the city plan commission should be made a county plan commission.

He humorously closed his speech with "It will either be Harding or Cox for president; Cincinnati will win the National league pennant, Cleveland the American league pennant and Cuyahoga county will have the greatest sewer and water system, making Ohio the greatest state in the Union."

Mr. Farnsworth, president of the Metropolitan Park board told of the proposed 70-mile county boulevard with a little speech, saying, "We're system. He said the county already glad you city and county officials had secured the property necessary for the boulevard in the Rocky River valley between Detroit and Lorain

Ave., and that all but six acres had been donated for the boulevard between Settlement road and the Stump road. He urged support at next election for the measure for levying 1c on a hundred dollar valuation of property for boulevard purposes.

Mr. Whitten, advisor to the City Plan Commission told of the plan for making Jennings road a main thoroughfare into the city and the proposed extension of Fulton road to relieve traffic on Pearl road and West 25th St. He also told of the general highway widening schemes.

County engineer Stinchcomb in addition to telling some new Irish stories said that few realized what momentous propositions the sewer districts really were. He advised a campaign of publicity to acquaint the people with their purpose and importance.

Engineers Garvin and McDowell, who made the report on the sanitary sewer districts told of some of the big questions involved in the development of the districts.

City Engineer Hoffman told of the city's engineering program and Assistant Prosecutor Bastian said that the Sanitary sewer district law was one of the best pieces of legislation for developing sewer and water systems in county area.

W. E. Rader, of the Cleveland Electric Illuminating Co. told how the residents of rural sections could get electric service.

Just A Warning

Has any merchant in Brooklyn an old bill against you? If he has, take this tip and pay him. For the merchants of the community are planning to form a credit system of their own, and if you have been on any merchant's books for a long time your name will very likely be listed with the bureau as "no good."

And more than this is liable to happen. If you don't pay up the account you may find your name published in a newspaper, offering to sell your account to anyone who wishes to buy it and attempt to collect it.

The credit system planned by Brooklyn merchants would be similar to that of the Cleveland Retail Credit association, but would be for the community only. The plan is to have every merchant who affiliates with the Brooklyn bureau to furnish all the names of "Poor payers" to the bureau and in return he would be supplied with the names of chronic delinquents furnished by the other merchants.

The purpose of the Brooklyn merchants is not to work hardship on any man or woman who delay in paying a bill because of misfortune. Most people at times find it difficult or impossible to pay all bills when due. In such cases the creditors should be notified, and if proper explanation is given a nextension of time will be willingly given.

The intention of the bureau is to single out the "dead beats"—the parasites of all those who meet their financial obligations. "Dead beats" deserve no credit and every merchant should be made familiar with the names of the men and women his community who will not meet their bills.

Again we advise those who have old accounts standing against them to pay up. The Brooklyn merchants are not going to make much noise about their credit system. They will likely go ahead and form one and advertise their delinquent accounts before many days go by.

So, if you fear publicity, settle up!

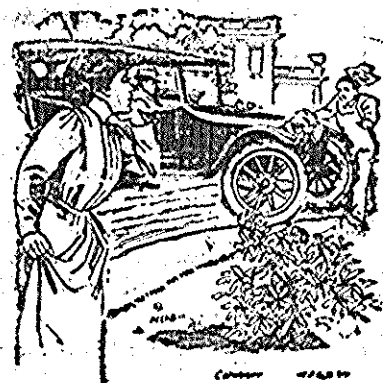
Eye Troubles Will Come
