



The action of the Southwestern Civic Association in appealing to the County Commissioners to take action to cause subdividers of property to have their plats approved by the county before selling of lots is commenced, is not intended in the least to discourage the buying of homesites.

The spirit of the association is to encourage homesite buying. It believes that every man should own his own home for home owning makes for better citizenship. But the association does wish that every prospective homesite buyer be protected from lot peddlers who sell property that has not been laid out in accordance with the best plans for the property's future development.

A plat may look well on a piece of paper, with beautiful shaded and winding boulevards drawn through it, but it may not conform at all with the scheme of the county for the proper development of the rural territory. The county now must take into consideration the future development of the rural territory and it must plan its thoroughfares to meet a population of fifty years

Streets that are laid out in discord with the general highway plan will some day have to be changed. And when the change comes the homesite owner may be greatly inconvenienced, if not out some money.

Residents along Bader Ave., between Pearl and State roads, can well testify as to the inconvenience one may be caused by buying a homesite in property the plat of which has not been approved by the county. After these people of the Bader Ave. community had bought their lots they sought to have their streets improved and water mains brought to their doors. But they were told that the plat had never been approved and that the city could do nothing until the streets were placed in acceptable shape. After a loss of much time and much work the streets were accepted by the city. And all this loss of time and work resulted because the allotment was not properly laid out.

The Southwestern Association advises every prospective homesite purchaser to inquire if the subdivision in which he intends to purchase has been approved. Unless the allotment in the county is approved it is more than likely that the county will not spend any money for its improvement. For the County Commissioners now have instructed the county prosecutor to draft a resolution to prohibit the spending of public funds on unapproved subdivisions. The commissioners are taking this course because the state laws do not give them the power to compel subdividers to have their plats approved before selling is commenced.
