If a mine sweeper is struck and the resultant explosion occurs forward in the bows, it may keep affoat and eventually be towed into harbor by one of her consorts. If the detonation took place amidships or in the stern, however, it was unlikely that the ship would survive, and the men in the engine room or boiler room would probably perish with the vessel.

Light Up The Park

Happening in Brookside park in the last fortnight has certainly forced home to fathers and mothers the need of better lighting and policing in the park.

Less than two weeks ago a young woman was viciously at tacked by a man, who with a revolver drove away her escort. When the escort returned with a policeman the young woman was found lying unconscious on the ground where has assaulter had left her.

On the same day the young woman was attacked, Mrs. Jacob Strauss, 4197 W. 50th street encountered the thief who stole her purse, containing \$15, in the park a few days previously. She was in the park with her two children when the thicf recognized her and laughed. "You weren't strong enough," he said. "So I

How long is the city going to tolerate the conditions that foster the commission of such crimes in Brookside Park? Will the city continue to keep its eyes closed to the elements that breed crime. Will it hesitate until the commission of some dastardly crime forces it to act?

Darkness is one of the greatest rendezvous of crime. And there is altogether too much darkness in Brookside park. The Brooklyn's Women's Civic league selected a committee to investigate the park. The committee reported there were no lights around the pavilion or surroundings and no light in the women's toilet. The arc light in the center of the lake and the one at the top of the stairs leading to W. 42d street were reported to be Company of the Company

The pavilion and the lake are among the spots often visited by frequenters to the park, yet, these places and their surroundings, according to the reports, are permitted to be enveloped in shadows and darkness, making the the commission of crime an easy matter.

These conditions can be remedied, and done so quickly, if the proper authorities will only stir themselves to action. The city sees to it that Edgewater Park is properly illuminated and enter policed.

We would like to ask, why this preference to Edgewater Park? Are the more aristocratic inhabitants of the lake region of Cleveland entitled to more consideration than those who live in the South Side? Certainly the residents of this community are entitled to a play ground which they can visit without being in fear of their personal safety, especially when safetyness can be accomplished at no greater cost than a few more electric lights and a little better policing.

Many young men and young women of Brooklyn are going to Edgewater and other city parks, just because Brookside offers them no recreational facilities or conveniences which are to be found in parks in more "high toned" sections of Cleveland. There is a pavilion in Brookside park, but it is locked and is being allowed to become in a dilapidated condition. Its outside walls are bedecked with pencil marks and in need of paint. The interior of the building, according to the statement of park officials, is sorely in need of repair.

The story that the city has no money to remedy affairs in the park is all bunk. It is true the city is financially handicapped but it always has money to spend lavishly on this or that political boss' hobby. It seems to be that Brookside is no politician's hobby and therefore is a neglected baby.

Action must be taken and it will be taken to improve the safety of visitors to Brookside park. But, unless the people of this community make their demand for better conditions strong enough, the improvements will not come unless forced by some crime or series of crimes.

The sanitary sewer districts are getting a lot of publicity. They now have come before the attention of Mayor Fitzgerald, who says in his opinion the sewer districts can best be developed by the adoption of the borough plan of government.

Now as far as the property owners of this territory are concerned they are not interested so much in discussions. They want SEWERS AND WATER.

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



HAY FEVER

The vagaries of hay fever would fill a book and it is annually a good subject for the country's jokesmiths. It changes the voice, it reddens the cyclids, it makes breathing difficult and correct and well-enunciated speech, especially the pronunciation of such words as must vibrate

through the nose is impossible. Webster says: "Hay fever—a catarrhal affection of the mucous membranes of the eye and respiratory tract." There is little to add to this definition except to say that the disease is marked by excessive heat in the mucous membranes, a thin, watery discharge from the nose, and sneez-

ing.

The flying pollen from flowers and plant life infects the sensitive membrane, and the generally accepted idea. is that the disease must run its course until frost brings relief. However, the fact has long been recog-nized that hay fever is unknown to those who are able to withstand the pollen infection. Only about one person in a hundred is affected, and if some way to restore the natural vigor of the mucous membranes were found, it has long been admitted, there would be no necessity for hay fever suffering.

this disease has been such that it is no longer listed as among the incurable ailments. Adjusting of the fourth cervical joint of the backbone, the only place where pressure upon the spinal nerve running to the nose passages could exist, is invariably followed by a reduction of the inflammation and a restoration of the normal health of the affected membranes and

air passages.

It is occasionally necessary to adjust differently for hay fever inflammation reaching down into the bron-chial passages. Hay fever affecting the bronchial passages is usually call-ed hay asthma, or autumnal asthma. Where the bronchial passages and the throat are affected, there is coughing

and spitting and breathing is difficult.

The time required for relief under adjusting will differ in nearly every case. Patients under twenty years of age, usually respond in a few adjustments, or at most in a fortnight. Older persons, with whom hay fever has been an annual visitor for many years; cannot expect such quick results. The happy prospect for those hay fever sufferers who tur nto chir-opractic, however, is that adjusting removes the cause. Many adjusted for hay fever have never had a return

CHILD VICTIMS OF SLAVERY ARE FOUND

Traded Like Live Stock in Southland.

Slavery in which children are made to work for nothing and are "swapped" like live stock—has been discovered in Tennessee.

Scores of prominent men are involved in the expose and investigators are preparing a mass of evidence to show that for years men of influence have bartered children, obtaining what Judge J. E. Richards calls "actual slaves" from the country industrial

Boys sent to the school for short sentences have been "given" to planters and others and kept until they were twenty-one years old. They were not paid for their labor and received no schooling whatever.

It is impossible, investigators say, to determine how extensive the slavery has been, since the records were often destroyed by school authorities.

The whole system came to light when Circuit Judge Pittman granted a habeas corpus writ to release Alvin Lee Crawford, fourteen-year-old negro, who was working at the home of Magistrate T. T. McDonald.

The boy was tried in the juvenile court two years ago for using a horse without the owner's consent. He was sentenced to 30 days at the farm. He was held a year and then Mogistrate McDonald "got him in a trade."

McDonald had previously visited the school and had a number of negro lads lined up before him.

"I picked out a likely lad," says the magistrate. "Later he became unruly and I swapped bim for this fel-
