# OBCDC's annual meeting conducted at Grace Church last month

Old Brooklyn Community Development Corporation held its annual meeting on the evening of October 18th. Grace Church next door to the CDC's new offices at 2339 Broadview Rd. provided the space for the meeting. There was a good turn out of CDC members with about 50 people attending.

The main purpose of the meeting was to report on the activities of the CDC this past year and to vote on new members of the Board of Directors. A copy of the annual report is available either on the CDC's web site at www.oldbrooklynconnected.com or for pick up at the CDC office. Some of the highlights from the report include the following:

Over 635 residents with over 792 referrals were given for a variety of housing rehabilitation & stabilization programs.

There were 64 meetings held serving 1500 residents around neighborhood safety programs.

There were 1092 code enforcement complaints tracked and served. Of this amount 966 were for housing code violations and 126 were related to commercial building violations.

The Old Brooklyn Connected web site now has over 8,000 users and nearly 90,000 page views per month.

There are now 17 members on Old Brooklyn's Board of Directors; four are institutional; five are commercial; eight are residential. Here are the new Board members' bio's:



On the evening of Tuesday, October 18th, members and other interested folks from the neighborhood attended OBCDC's annual meeting, held in the basement of Grace Church.

# MetroHealth's rehab inpatient services to move to Old Brooklyn campus

MetroHealth has announced plans to focus its skilled nursing services at its Elizabeth Severance Prentiss Center for Skilled Nursing Care at MetroHealth and its inpatient skilled nursing unit at MetroHealth Medical Center.

To accomplish this, MetroHealth will work with the skilled nursing and long term care residents currently at their Senior Health & Wellness Center to arrange for placement in other community-based facilities best suited to meet their needs.

Recent reductions in government reimbursement and rising medical costs contributed to the need to streamline skilled nursing and long term care services.

"This change maintains our responsibility to the overall financial health of the System," said Mark Moran, MetroHealth President and CEO. "We will continue to review and refine our service delivery to ensure excellent quality and maximum efficiency."

The move will allow inpatient rehabilitation patients from the MetroHealth Rehabilitation Institute of Ohio at MetroHealth Medical Center to be transitioned into the Senior Health & Wellness Center, an environment better suited to the rehabilitation inpatient. The vacated space at MetroHealth's main campus will allow for the future expansion of services there.

"MetroHealth remains committed to the comprehensive care of seniors through our Senior Health Outpatient Program at the Senior Health & Wellness Center in Old Brooklyn, which brings together primary and specialty physicians in one clinical area," said James Campbell, MD, Executive Director, Post-Acute Care.

"By streamlining our system of care, we will continue providing these specialized services to the community while also best utilizing existing facilities for acute rehabilitation services," said Dr. Campbell.

The Senior Health & Wellness Center will need to undergo some renovations before the MetroHealth Rehabilitation Institute of Ohio can relocate to the building. MetroHealth will move approximately 164 full-time employees to the site and will have the capacity to treat up to 62 rehabilitation patients after the renovations are completed.

The Rehabilitation Institute is expected to relocate in Summer 2012. The Institute provides inpatient rehabilitation services for brain injury, spinal cord injury and stroke patients and a variety of outpatient rehabilitation services.

Pastor Marco went on to say, "I believe Cleveland is on its way back to being the great city it once was. The revitalization attitude of city is everyplace. At the age of 21, at the Tri-County Baptist Church of Northville, Michigan, Dr. Marco received Christ as his Savior. Shortly thereafter he became a preacher. In 1985, he participated in the founding and developing of the "God Save America Conference" and the Gospel Net Magazine. From 1986-1993, he worked to develop and publish the "REVIVAL FIRES!" Newspaper. He also designed, developed and was managing editor of "The Baptist Magazine" for Longview Baptist Temple of Longview, Texas.

Dr. Marco is an Evangelist and a conference speaker. Thousands have received Christ as their Savior with over 6,500 following in believers' Baptism in his meetings.

Recently, Dr. Marco completed a project with Missionaries in Cameroon, Africa. In the revival meetings over 1,000 people received Christ as Savior and a new church was born. In 2009 Pastor Marco and a pastor from San Antonio established the Texas Baptist Seminary, which is an online, independent Baptist Seminary. He is currently the President.

"Now I have come to Cleveland during a very exciting time of development for our city's and church's future. I can't wait to get started making a difference in this great city."

I was on my way down Memphis Ave. when I saw a young man walking along with his pants hanging so low that I had to see his underwear. I stopped and said to the young man to please pull up his pants; he's not at home and there were other younger kids on the street. He did it!!

All I did was to ask. That doesn't mean that it will always work, but we need to take that step. Our businesses, schools and churches need to listen and guide these kids,

#### SCR to host Advocacy Day, Mon., Nov. 7th

Senior Citizen Resources, Inc. (SCR) learned last month through the Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging that the Older Americans Act, which protects and helps seniors across the country maintain their independence, expired on September 30th, 2011. For the first time, it was not reauthorized.

In place since 1965, The Older Americans Act works to provide funding to congregate (like at Deaconess-Krafft) and home-delivered meals programs, transportation, social services, employment services, legal assistance and more. Its services help caregivers receive support and respite; help keep people out of nursing homes by providing in-home services; and offer linkage to vital resources to both seniors and their families.

The deadline for reauthorization has been extended until December 31, 2011-but due to the current political and economic climates, the program is threatened with major cutbacks which will affect those served.

The National Area Agency on Aging needs Congress to modernize the Older Americans Act to provide funding to reflect the growing number of Americans who are reaching the over-sixty age group; make up for some of the severe budget cuts that have been implemented at a state level; preserve the commitment to the people served; offer resources on a community level to help prepare for the growing number of aging Americans; integrate preventative services; and develop long-term care services and new programs and initiatives.

Senior Citizen Resources needs the help of Old Brooklyn residents. SCR will be hosting an Advocacy Day on Monday, November 7th, beginning at 10:30 a.m., at their center at 3100 Devonshire Rd. Steven Inchak, a Senior Social Worker on U.S. Congressional Representative's Dennis Kucinich's staff, will be there to speak and kick off an advocacy campaign on behalf of the people SCR currently serves (as well as anyone who will ever reach age sixty and over).

SCR will be conducting a letter-writing campaign to those members of Congress who have the power to reauthorize the Older Americans Act and appropriate the funding which is needed for vital programs. They invite you to join them that day to learn more about the Older Americans Act and to advocate on your own and/or someone you know's behalf.

Pre-written letters to Congressional representatives will be available to sign; in addition, computers will be available for folks who prefer to write their own letters. SCR will also be taking pictures of people (with their permission) who are affected by the changes in the Older Americans Act. Those pictures will be included with the letters to Congress.

Senior Citizen Resources hopes that many people will join them so that they can touch as many people and lives as possible. Together, they hope to be able to make a difference in the lives of the hundreds of seniors they serve at SCR, and the millions of other Americans who are sixty and over around the country.

# Political sign do's & don'ts

The City of Cleveland regulates signs, including political signs, under its Zoning Code. The first rule is that political signs cannot be placed on any public property, public right-of-way, utility pole, bridge or bridge abutment. There are also rules for placement of political

There are also rules for placement of political signs at residential, retail and commercial properties:

- Size The maximum size of any political sign is 8 square feet if located in a residential area and 64 square feet if located in a non-residential district. A sign that is 8 square feet is approximately 2'8" by 2'8".
- Sign Placement Political signs must be at least 5 feet from the lot line in residential areas. The law varies for retail and commercial properties; a City of Cleveland Zoning Administrator can be reached at 216-664-2910 for specific guidance.
- Vertical Clearance Signs must be at least 10 feet above the sidewalk or other pedestrian way and at least 16 feet above a road for vehicular traffic.
- Visibility at Intersections Signs shall be located and designed so as to maintain a substantially clear view between 2.5 feet and 8 feet above grade in a triangle formed by intersecting street right-of-way lines and a line 30 feet from the point where the street lines intersect. At the intersection of a driveway and a public street, such triangle shall be defined by the street right-of-way line, the driveway pavement edge and a line 10 feet from the point of intersection.

There are no specific regulations about how long one can keep a political sign displayed. However, residents should be courteous and take signs down shortly after elections to improve the overall curb appeal of the neighborhood.

The Old Brooklyn Community Development Corporation (OBCDC) publishes an annual report. The report for fiscal year 2010-2010 (July 1st – June 30th) was released on October 18th. Following is the section that reports on the commercial services activities of the Old Brooklyn Community Development Corporation.

#### **Commercial Services**

In a stressful economy Old Brooklyn saw several new businesses open. On the restaurant front Gyro Guys opened on Pearl Rd. and Acropolis Taverna opened on Memphis Ave. Downtown Old Brooklyn is home to a new barber shop and pet grooming service while a nail salon moved from a second floor location to a store front at the Memphis- Pearl intersection

The downside in downtown Old Brooklyn was the closing of GilDor Furniture because of the family's permanent relocation out-of-state. While the U S Bank branch remained open for this fiscal year, its closing at the end of last month is a serious challenge for OBCDC and the community. As of this writing the future of the Pearlbrook Station (post office) is not known. OBCDC is orchestrating a letter -writing campaign to keep it open.

The Krather Building remains on the market. It continues to draw interest from developers who understand the importance of the tax credits associated with historic preservation.

The RTA garage also remains an important site for creative redevelopment. There are not too many developers interested in a five acre site with 112,000 square foot garage, but OBCDC will continues to work with RTA and the commercial real estate broker to showcase this unique building.

#### **Storefront Renovation Program**

The Cleveland Storefront Renovation program provides either a 40% rebate or low cost loans for exterior renovations and signage for older commercial buildings. Wee Kare Day Care on Broadview Rd. completed the exterior renovations through the program. The front porch was restored, the home was painted with historically accurate colors, a faux brick driveway was poured and an attractive new sign was installed. This was a \$38,000 business investment in Old Brooklyn.

#### **Business and Institutional Support**

The OBCDC commercial manager provided 182 business assists on a wide variety of issues including zoning changes, business planning, operational challenges, marketing, expansion, leasing, building code compliance, security, neighbor relations and exit strategies. Eight of those businesses received assistance in the all- important area of start up, expansion or retention.

The commercial manager informs businesses about City and County financial assistance programs which can help a business expand, relocate or even start a new business.

The manager is the liaison to the Near West Design and Review Committee and the Brooklyn Centre Historic District Design and Review Committee.

The manager helps commercial property owners and business operators navigate the various departments of Cleveland City government with respect to permits, zoning and City loans. The position functions as a business generalist who can match the resources with the opportunity.

#### **Business Promotion**

Networking and promotion is essential to business growth. To that end a group of Old Brooklyn merchants organized a business promotion event named *Pedal for Prizes* which brought 475 bicyclists to ride throughout Old Brooklyn. Some of that group later returns for other rides in the community that finish with a impromptu visit to a neighborhood tavern or restaurant. Although these events were not organized by Old Brooklyn Community Development Corporation, they do support the CDC mission to promote Old Brooklyn as a Cleveland neighborhood and deserving of CDC promotion.

Over the past several years there has been an informal breakfast gathering of small business owners once a month. These are casual conversations about doing business in the community. New business relationships have been born as a result of this gathering.

#### **Maintaining Commercial Property**

There are two primary tools OBCDC uses to work to keep commercial properties maintained. One is the local Design and Review Committee process which ensures that in a designated area all exterior changes to buildings and parking lots must be approved by the local committee. The purpose is to see that changes meet building code, are compatible with the architecture of the building and do

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not visibly detract from the neighboring buildings. There is one design and review committee for Old Brooklyn and another for Brooklyn Centre. In the 2010-11 fiscal year, nine businesses presented plans which were approved and none were denied approval.

OBCDC's second tool is commercial code enforcement. That means actual visual inspection of the exterior of commercial buildings and if conditions warrant, requesting an official inspection from the Cleveland Department of Building and Housing. This tool is often used as an informative action that lets property owners know about deteriorating building conditions and assistance which may be available to correct problems. When necessary, it is used to bring an noncompliant property owner to court to resolve violations.

The Cleveland Police Department's Second District Commander Keith Sulzer strongly recommends that everyone who owns a bicycle take the time to write down the serial number, make, model and all other identifying information and keep it in a safe place. In the event that a bicycle is stolen, it is critical that

this information be included when the police report is filed. Commander Sulzer said that the Police Department finds bicycles and other stolen items all the time but is unable to return them to the rightful owners because the serial numbers were not listed in the police report.

Rodger of Fridrich's Bicycle said that

most bicycles' serial numbers can be found on the bottom of the frame, specifically on the underside of the bottom brackets (what the bike pedals rotate on). Rodger added that anyone having trouble finding the serial number can call him at 216-651-3800 for assistance.

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# Czech Clevelanders establish organizations for culture, health, fun and \$\$\$

Our discussion of the Cleveland Czech/Bohemian community continues this month, as we pick up where we left off in October, with societies/organizations/meeting places. But before we actually move on to institutions beyond the Bohemian National Hall, I want to share some information I received from Scott Phillips of Duneland Beach, Indiana.

A former Clevelander -- he grew up on E. 108th St. between Kinsman and Union --Scott is an amateur genealogist and historian who is very involved with delving into his Bohemian/Czech heritage.

(A cousin who still lives here had sent him our articles about the Czechs in Cleveland in the last two issues of the Old Brooklyn News. Overall he was in agreement with the information in the articles, so pleased, in fact, to read about such ethnic things that he's decided to subscribe to our newspaper. However...)

In my September article I had written, after listing the trades in which skilled Czech immigrants earned a living, that "the unskilled Czech immigrants worked on farms or made barrels in John D. Rockefeller's oil refineries". What I said was based on information I'd read about the Czechs in The Encyclopedia of Cleveland History.

It so happens that Scott's grandfather was a barrel maker, officially known as a cooper, and, Scott reported, barrel makers are skilled laborers, too.

In my October article, quoting directly from the article about Czechs in The Encyclopedia..., I'd written, "Not until the 1930s did freethinkers and Catholics freely associate with each other."

That, however, was not Scott's lived experience. He comes from a long line of free thinkers and wrote: "Even up to my youth, I was forbidden --- I mean FORBID-DEN --- from even playing with any Catholic

I mentioned last month that in 1975 the Bohemian National Hall, 4939 Broadway Ave., had been purchased by American Sokol, Inc., and leased to Sokol Greater

Cleveland Gymnastic Educational Organization, Inc. But actually, Sokol Greater Cleveland's... legal name was still Sokol Tyrs in 1975. (Read the details later this article.) Volunteers from all Greater Cleveland's Sokol units helped to renovate the hall.

Sokol means falcon and Cleveland has Sokol groups among both the Czechs and 1957 rehearsal. Photo courtesy of the Poles. In addition to being a Czech sur-

name, Sokol is the name of the Czech organization whose goal was to develop "a sound mind in a sound body". Sokols accomplished this through dramatic and musical training, lectures on educational subjects and the establishment of libraries. In addition, gymnastic training, with strong nationalist overtones, has been a big part of the Czech-American Sokol movement.

Sokols began in Prague (Praha) and were named for the bird known for its strength and freedom, the qualities the movement wanted to cultivate through its program of gymnastics and physical training. Cleveland's first Sokol, Sokol Cech/Czech, was organized in 1879 on Wendell Ave.

Over the years, there have been numerous Czech Sokol units in Greater Cleveland.

Sokol Cleveland was organized in 1895 on Plymouth (Central) Ave. In 1910 it built a hall on Quincy Ave. and organized a women's auxiliary. In 1946 it opened a new hall on Harvard Ave.

Sokol Nova Vlast was organized in 1892

Sokol Havlicek was organized in 1905. In 1921 Sokol Cech and Sokol Havlicek merged.

Sokol Jan Amos Komensky was organized in 1919 in the Mount Pleasant neighborhood. The group changed its name to Sokol Tyrs in 1926. Sokol Tyrs established a Sewing Club (1928), a concert band (1957), a Junior Hobby Club (1959) and a Little Theater Group (1959).

In 1960 Sokol Cleveland merged with Sokol Cech-Havlicek.

Sokol Tyrs and Sokol Nova Vlast. formed American Sokol, Inc. in 1965 to raise funds to build a new Sokol hall and community center. Sokol Greater Cleveland, the only remaining Czech Sokol organization

in this area, came into existence when Sokol Tyrs officially changed its name again.

In 1976, Sokol Tyrs incorporated Sokol Nova Vlast and then adopted its current name, Sokol Greater Cleveland Gymnastic and **Educational** Organization, Inc.

In 1985, the merged Sokol Cleveland-Sokol Cech-Havlicek organization dissolved and many of its members joined Sokol Greater

The Delnicka Telocvicna Jednota (Workers Gymnastic Union), aka, DTJ, was organized in 1909. In the 1920s it built Taborville, a 110-acre summer camp, farm and cooperative community southeast of Chagrin Falls in Geauga County. Many Czech gymnastic and social events were held

In addition to Bohemian National Hall, Czechs also built other halls. Roman Catholics established the Czech Ceska Sin Karlin Hall and Club, 5304 Fleet Ave. On the west side, Sokol Ceska Sin was erected at 4314 Clark Ave. in 1910.

The Czech National Union, established in 1879, expanded into many states and became one of Cleveland's oldest fraternal organizations. But the fraternal organizations also reflected the religious break in the Czech community.

Obviously, The Czech Catholic Union and the Catholic Order of the Foresters were founded by Catholics; the Czechoslovak Society of America and the Western Fraternal Life Association were founded by freethinking Czechs. These organizations provided social, educational, cultural and recreational opportunities, as well as savings and loan societies and insur-

Other Czechs founded separate savings and loans associations -- the First Federal Savings & Loan Association of Cleveland, the Oul Savings & Loan Company and the People's Savings & Loan Association.

Local Czech newspapers, too, presented

the views of the different segments of Czech society. Pokrok ("Progress"), established in 1871, was Cleveland's first progressive Czech newspaper. It was followed by a progressive weekly, **Dennice Novoveku** ("Star of the New Era"), and a daily, Svet ("The World"). The same management produced all three.

Cleveland was also a center for Czech socialism; the weekly newspaper, Americke Icke Delnicke Listy ("American Workman's -- or Labor -- News"), began publication in 1909. Catholics preferred another Czech newspaper, the American.

In 1939, Svet bought out the American and became the Svet-American. From then until the summer of 1950, when it closed down, the Svet-American was the only Czech daily newspaper published in Cleveland.

A new Czech daily, Novy Svet ("New World") then came into being; it endured until 1977.

The Czechs were music lovers. From their beginnings here, Czech musicians played in the theater and opera orchestras.

Drama, musical and dance groups helped preserve their ethnic heritage. A musical organization called the Lumir-Hlahol-Tyl Singing Society was established in 1867; the Vojan Singing Society (1924) and the Vcelka Czech Dramatic Society were organized in later years.

A significant number of the founding members of the Cleveland Orchestra (1918) were Czech. The Broadway Conservatory of Music, originally the Hruby Conservatory of Music, was established by Czech musicians whose surname was Hruby. Located on Broadway Ave. near E. 55th St., the school closed in 1968. During its heyday, it had also expanded to two additional locations and was where many thousands of students learned to play musical instruments.

Although the movement of Czechs to southeastern suburbs (most notably Maple Heights), beginning shortly after World War I weakened the old neighborhoods and many of the institutions located in them, the Czechs have still managed to maintain their ethnic identity.

In addition to the organizations listed in this article, the churches which their ancestors established are another way through which that's been accomplished. Most - but not all -- of those congregations are Roman

We'll conclude our discussion of Cleveland's Czechs next month with the churches. Since it will also be our Christmas issue, I'd be happy to include Czech holiday traditions along with brief histories of the founding of each church congregation.


