## **Bradley Road Surface Mining permit** before Board of Zoning Appeals

On January 17, 2012, the Cleveland Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA) agreed to postpone the Bradley Road Surface Mining Permit appeal until April 2, at 9:30 a.m.

They did so at the request of Mayor Jackson in order to "modify" the conditions in the letter of intent between the City of Cleveland and the property tenants, Landsong Environmental, Inc. and Ty Incorporated (aka, the appellant). Legally

the Board of Zoning Appeals by close of business on February 17. BZA in turn will forward the letter of intent to Ward 12 Council Member Anthony Brancatelli and Old Brooklyn Community Development Corporation (OBCDC). Old Brooklyn CDC will post the letter to its web site.

BZA further instructed both the City and the appellant that they will not accept any request for another postponement, should

the appellants are the property owners William Baumann, et al. Tom Simich is the owner/president Landsong Environmental, Inc. and Ty, Incorporated, the tenants on the property. The Board of Zoning Appeals recognizes the tenant as the agent for the property owner.

In agreeing to postpone until April 2, the Board of Zoning Appeals instructed the City to submit the "modified" letter of intent to either party believe it necessary, after close of business on March 22. Prior to that date either the City or the appellant can request another postponement. The Board will then decide if a postponement is warranted.

## EPA, City and residents debate CREG Center

The CREG Center, or the Cleveland Recycling and Energy Generation Center, is a proposed \$180 million facility at the City

of Cleveland's Ridge Road Transfer Station at 3727 Ridge Rd. that would combine recycling separation and collection with the gasification of the remain-

ing solid waste into "syngas", a fuel similar to natural gas. The syngas would be used as fuel to produce an estimated 15 megawatts of electricity, enough to power up to 15,000

The City of Cleveland's Department of Public Utilities states that the CREG Center will increase recycling, reduce dumping at landfills, generate electricity, create jobs, and reduce cost, while reducing the City's overall carbon footprint.

Cleveland Public Power has applied for a permit the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for the NG & FAFRGY GENERATION release of airborne pollu-

tants related to the combustion of the syngas. As part of this permit, the Ohio EPA requires a public comment period which included two public meetings at the Estabrook Recreation Center on January 12th and January 19th. During these meetings, public concerns focused on the release of airborne

## Committee plans fundraiser for March 24th to support Ben Franklin Community Garden





Imagine that your house has been broken into, the Police are just leaving and the officer says, "You should be involved in Crime Watch!" Your head

is spinning and you think WHAT IS CRIME

Crime Watch is a neighborhood watch program which enlists the active participation of citizens in cooperation with law enforcement to reduce crime in communities. Networks of neighbors are trained by crime prevention officers about how to protect themselves and their property as well as how to serve effectively as additional eyes and ears for law enforcement agencies in the community.

#### WHY neighborhood watch?

- One in four of all households are victim ized by violence or theft.

- Criminals know that this is a working class neighborhood, and count on residents to replace what they worked so hard for.

mercury and lead, increased truck traffic along Ridge Rd., the potential for cost overruns, and uncertainty with the proposed gasification technology.

What a glorious winter we've been blessed with this year! The snowdrops in my garden started blooming a couple of weeks ago and most of my rose bushes never lost all their leaves (and the "Queen Elizabeth" even still has two pink rosebuds on it!) What pleasure to think that in six and a half weeks, spring will officially be here!

This is also one of the four times during the year when there are five rather than four weeks between issues of the *Old Brooklyn News*. But whether it would have been four or five weeks, this month I'm again back looking at authors, book titles and publishers with Cleveland connections.

When I signed off last month I was in the process of reporting titles which Cleveland-based **Gray & Company, Publishers** had released in the past few years. So first I'll pick up with where I left off with them...

As mentioned last month, Gray & Company's first book was published in 1992, and over the years, a number of their releases have been written by the same person. One of those persons is meteorologist **Dick Goddard** who has been plying his trade on Channel 8 for fifty years. According to the book, that's a record for a television meteorologist anywhere.

For some years, Gray & Company had published an annual almanac which Dick compiled, but in 2011, they did something different by releasing a book Dick put together of his memoirs. It's a 143-page soft-cover book called *Six Inches of Partly Cloudy* which retails for \$12.95.

Just the photos -- fifty years of men's fashions and hair styles -- would be great, but this book has cartoons, quotes, wisdom and captivating text covering all of Dick's life as well. An animal lover, Dick is donating his profits from its sale to "animal charities".

Books related to Cleveland sports are

another of Gray & Company's specialties, and Cleveland sportswriter **Dan Coughlin** was a "natural" to be one of their authors. He covered the topic for forty-five years in our city via his jobs with the *Cleveland Plain Dealer*, WJW-TV, magazines and radio; in the process he earned a number of professional awards for his writing, too.

Dan retired from his last job at WJW in 2009, but in 2010, his first book of whacky memories, *Crazy with the Papers to Prove It* came out. It's soft-cover and 272 pages long, mostly text with a few pictures. It retails for \$14.95

A year later, its sequel, *Pass the Nuts*, was published. It, too, is a soft-cover text with some pictures and priced at \$14.95, but it has a few less pages -- 262, to be exact. Both books contain stories about the most unusual, eccentric and outlandish people Dan's known in his four decades as a sports journalist.

The final Gray & Company release to mention this time is a hardcover book priced at \$24.95. Published in 2009, it's called "Gimme Rewrite, Sweetheart...", with the subtitle Tales From the Last Glory Days of Cleveland Newspapers Told by the Men and Women who Reported the News.

Most people reading this column will remember when Cleveland had two daily newspapers -- the *Cleveland Press* exited the scene on June 17th, 1982 -- and some of us even remember the *Cleveland News*, which was sold to the *Cleveland Press* on January 23rd, 1960.

In the days when Cleveland was a two-orthree newspaper town, being a journalist at one of the dailies was a very exciting job. Author **John Tidyman** has divided his 253-page book into chapters dealing with different aspects of the newspaper publishing business, and in each chapter, veteran Cleveland journalists tell stories from the years of their newspaper careers.

The name of a journalist which anyone who reads the *Cleveland Plain Dealer* these days is sure to recognize is **Regina Brett**. Because of the insightful columns which she writes a few times a week for the newspaper, Regina has received numerous writing awards, and has also been a finalist two times for the Pulitzer Award in the category of commentary.

In April, 2010, Grand Central Publishing released Regina's first book, *God Never Blinks*. It billed itself as "50 Lessons for Life's Little Detours" and catapulted Regina onto the New York Times Bestseller's List. It was inspired by rough times in Regina's own life, including a battle with cancer at age 41. Hardcover, it is priced at \$21.99.

Just last month, Grand Central Publishing released Regina's second book, *Be the Miracle...* Organized very much like her first successful volume, it is "50 Lessons for Making the Impossible Possible". Also hard-cover, it's priced at \$22.99.

Regina's lessons are filled with spiritual values; we are, as Pierre Teilhard de Chardin, S.J., observed, "spiritual beings having a human experience", not vice versa. But the essays do not come off as stuffy religious preaching, but rather very naturally and comfortably. I think that after I finish reading *Be the Miracle...* I should re-read *God Never Blinks*, to keep reminding myself about what's really important in life.

I mentioned **Arcadia Publishing** in the December segment of this three-part book round-up, but at that time, the only book I'd actually seen of the six I wanted to write about was **Judith Cetina**, **Ph.D.'s**, **Cuyahoga County: The First 200 Years**. Now I have the five others in front of me.

Like all of the Arcadia books I have mentioned either in book review articles or as sources for my historical writing, these are just a few of the thousands of titles in the company's *Images of America* series. Each is 127 or 128 pages long and is formatted with 200 sepia-toned photos and explanatory text. Authors from across the country contract with Arcadia to put these local history books together, usually about a municipality or organization near where they live.

And so Seven Hills resident **John Sabol**, author of two previous Arcadia books, *Cleveland Czechs* and *Cleveland Slovaks*, last year had a book (largely) about Cleveland Hungarians published. It's called, *Cleveland's Buckeye Neighborhood*.

More nostalgia about Cleveland's Eastern European ethnic groups, especially the Czechs and the Poles, can be found in Arcadia's *Slavic Village* (the eastern side of Old Brooklyn's Ward 12!). Written by **Sandy Mitchell** in association with the **Slavic Village Historical Society**, it was released in 2009.

As for other relatively recent Arcadia books which deal with locations close to Old Brooklyn --

In 2004, the Cuyahoga Valley Historical Museum and the Cuyahoga Valley National Park Association saw their collaborative effort in print as Arcadia's Cuyahoga Valley. It focused on the Canal and River towns which are/were south-east of Brecksville-Thornburg, Jaite, Brandywine, Boston, Peninsula, Everett and Botzum, rather than the north end of the Valley in Cleveland proper.

In 2006, **Thomas Matowitz, Jr.'s** *Cleveland Metroparks* was published. It has early photos of the older "Metropolitan Park" reservations on both the east and west sides of Greater Cleveland (so no pictures of our Brookside Reservation/Park or the Zoo, which were relatively recent additions to the Emerald Necklace, are included).

In 2009, Arcadia released retail historian **Christopher Faircloth's** *Cleveland's Department Stores*. The book is approximately 75% downtown stores and 25% after some of them established branches in the suburbs. It is a real trip down memory lane for anyone who knows what it was like to shop in downtown Cleveland in its glory days.

The Cleveland Metroparks book retails for \$19.99. All the others are priced at \$21.99.

From time to time I also receive an email asking me if I would like to receive a review copy of a novel which a local author has written. Such was the case last November, when **Red Giant books** contacted me about a book which **Rick Ridgway** of Mentor-on-the-Lake wrote

The book is called *Ablaze*, and it was copyrighted in 2010. The author's second published work, it's set in 1993, with the protagonist being a divorced guy on a week-long road trip with his best friend, trying to make sense of their lives. The book's price is \$13.

## Joe Gigante & Sons

Joe Gigante and Sons was started in 1975. In May of that year, I, Joe Junior bought a dump truck. When my dad saw me pull in, his eyes got wide and he smiled and said, "I guess we're in business now." I paid \$500.00 for that truck, it needed some work, but it ran. It had no power steering, and brakes that had to be pumped to stop.

When we removed an existing driveway back then, we used a sledge hammer, long 6 ft. steel bars, picks and shovels. We loaded the truck by hand, no backhoe or front end loaders. It was my uncle George, 4 of my brothers, and me working away from 7:30 am to 4:30 pm every day. We worked like machines. When we came home my mom would have dinner for us. It seemed there was never enough food, after we ate at home we would go out to eat somewhere else, then we would go out and lift weights or run up and down Brookside Hill. (For real)

A story I remember about my Dad, was one evening while he was out giving estimates, he stopped at a red light, as he looked at his notes his foot slipped off the brakes and bumped into the car in front of him. He immediately put his pick up truck into park, got out of the truck and approached the car in front of him. The man was sitting in the driver's seat with his hands on the steering wheel. There was yellow goo coming from the top of the man's head and dripping down his face. My dad thought he had hit the man harder than he thought and the man hit his head on the steering wheel and his head must have exploded with his brains coming out of his head. My dad never having seen such a thing before was ready to find a phone to call an ambulance. Dad looked over at the man's wife, she was sitting there with her eyes tearing up, and she began to laugh hysterically. Dad was so confused, after a few seconds, she explained that her husband was ok. They had just come from Honey Hut and her husband was ready to take a swig of his banana milk shake at the same time my dad bumped into him. The driver just sat there with the milkshake running down the top of his head down his face, to angry to move or yell.

This is just one of the many funny and dramatic stories of our business lives as a family operation.

As I tell this story, I really start to miss my dad even more. He was not only my dad but my partner in business. When he died he left a hole in me. I know nothing will ever fill that hole but the peace of God to endure, the grace of God to move forward. If anyone has lost a loved one God's peace and grace is for you also. Just ask him, your loved ones are standing next to him, cheering us on to move forward. What is really important in life is that we can become an instrument of His love.

February is the month for business planning. It is time to prepare the year end financial statements. It is tax preparation time. It is time to take the physical inventory of stock. It is also a good time to assess the value of your business and property to determine if it is time for new investment in your building.

If you own commercial property or operate a business in a building in need of renovation, February should be your planning month. It is a fine time to talk to contractors and architects. It is a fine time to look at materials and attend building trade shows. It is a fine time to ask yourself what can be done to make your building more attractive to business tenants, to rent the empty storefront or increase customer visits to the store.

As the winter heating bills arrive it is time to get that energy audit and make some changes to conserve energy and reduce operating costs.

Sometimes you just have to invest in a renovation to make your building competitive, to keep existing tenants and attract new tenants. The appearance of your building is the first impression customers and tenants receive. A poor impression is an invisible expense in lost opportunity and is difficult

The City of Cleveland has an incentive program to help commercial property owners renovate storefronts and thereby improve the appearance of the commercial corridors. It is titled the Cleveland Storefront Renovation Program. It provides a 40 % rebate on the cost of exterior improvements to the fronts of eligible buildings. It can refund as much as \$28,000 to the building owner or building tenant, if they follow the program guidelines.

The intention is to restore the building to its original architectural integrity and make a visible improvement to the appearance of the neighborhood. It is not a program to make up for neglected maintenance. It is rather a restoration program that can provide new doors, windows, signage, lighting, structural repair, awnings, painting, masonry cleaning and new sidewalks. It is a face-lift for aging buildings in need of a makeover.

The owner manages the project following some basic guidelines that recognize that restored buildings have a more welcoming presence than buildings that cover up unique architectural features in an attempt to look modern.

The owner solicits bids from contractors who must be licensed to work in the city of Cleveland. There are some prevailing wage guidelines that may be applicable. Of course there is some paperwork involved. I assist the owner with that part of the project.

If the building is in need of major exterior renovations on the entire building (front, sides and rear) then a low-cost loan program is available. An owner can borrow up to \$100,000 for exterior renovations at below prime interest rates. It is a fixed rate loan amortized over fifteen years payable in ten years.

Calling me to learn if your building is eligible does not obligate you to anything. I would be happy to meet with interested owners, visit the building, discuss the process and submit a preliminary application. There are no upfront charges and no fees associated with the rebate program. The City has a very good tool available to assist commercial property owners.

Use February as your planning month. Call me to see if this program meets your needs or if there are other financial tools available that will help commercial property owners improve their property and improve the bottom line.

#### Sidewalk Signs

It often comes as a surprise to many business owners but signs cannot be placed on the sidewalk. It is illegal in the City of Cleveland to place an easel sign in the public right of way. It is considered an obstruc-

tion and a hazard.

Over the last year there has been a visible increase in businesses that place two sided easel or "sandwich boards" on the sidewalk advertising the business or products. Enforcement of the prohibiting ordinance is the responsibility of the Cleveland Bureau of Sidewalks. Generally an inspector will inform the business of the ordinance allowing the business to immediately remove it. A repeat offense will result in a violation notice and a fine.

Sidewalk inspectors are not on the prowl looking for the signs but they do respond to citizens who call the bureau or the Mayor's hotline. That has prompted the inspectors to visit the commercial corridors of Old Brooklyn.

The program provides an extremely low-cost energy assessment to determine what upgrades a home needs. The resident needs to hire an approved contractor to complete the work, either self-financed or with a low cost loan through CASH. # Free tax return preparation help available at South Brooklyn Library

A free tax preparation service & Earned Income Tax Credits for low and moderate income families exists.

Through the Cuyahoga EITC Coalition volunteers (Earned Income Tax Credit), low-income taxpayers can receive quality tax preparation, wealth building opportunities and other services.

EITC is a refundable tax credit available to working adults without children earning up to \$15,880 through families with at least two children earning as much as \$41,646. The credit can be as large as \$4,824 and the average EITC credit for Cuyahoga County in 2006 was \$1,918. In highly urban areas, it is estimated that between 15 and 20 percent of those eligible for this credit do not claim it. These are dollars that do not go to the hard working families that earned them and therefore not into the Cuyahoga County economy.

The Cuyahoga EITC Coalition promotes free tax preparation services for middle and low-income filers. Many filers are subject to filing fees and refund anticipation loans (RALs) sold to them by private forprofit businesses. These fees and loans are avoided by using the Coalition's free tax sites throughout the City of Cleveland and Cuyahoga County. The sites are free, quick, and an efficient alternative to paid preparers.

#### Other Tax Saving Tips

- Install energy-saving improvements such as insulation, doors, and windows in your home to quality for a tax credit of up to \$500. (www.energystar.gov)
- The Recovery Act Tax Savings Tool is an online application that can help taxpayers determine their potential eligibility for various tax benefits available under American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. Taxpayers who use this tool are still responsible for determining their eligibility under applicable laws for any claimed tax benefits. (http://www.whitehouse.gov/recovery/taxsaving-tool)
- Teachers can take up to \$250 in tax deductions for classroom supplies purchased in 2011 and business owners can take a number of tax deductions for investing in their businesses.

• There are also tax savings available to people who make maximum retirement plan contributions. The maximum contribution for an IRA is \$5,000 (\$6,000 if 50 years or older), \$11,500 for a Simple IRA (\$14,000 if 50 years or older), or \$16,500 for a 401 (k) plan (\$22,000 if 50 years or older). ## More resident tips for surviving Cleveland's winter season

Clevelanders are finally experiencing some of winter's fury -- though a relatively mild fury, this year -- and the *Old Brooklyn News* continues the suggestions for making winter more manageable which we began last month:

Snow tires should go on a vehicle's drive axle (meaning on the front for front wheel drives and on the rear for rear wheel drives).

When putting on last year's studded snow

tires, remember that they should go in the same vehicle position that they were in when taken off: driver side front, passenger side front, driver side rear and/or passenger side rear.

Snow tires can still be purchased and, for a fee, new snow tires can be studded. Most places only put snow studs on new tires, and there's often a one-day wait to get them, because this is usually done by hand. However, a dealer may be able to order prestudded tires.

Cars with studded snow tires are permitted in Ohio from November 1st through April 15th. To check out Ohio's snow tire code, see http://codes.ohio.gov/orc/5589.081

With either plan, program the phone number in your cell phone.

## Catholic Czechs establish more congregations on east side of Cleveland

As I continue the story of the Bohemian/Czech immigrants to Cleveland, there is one thing of which I have become most certain - a decent percentage of their descendants read the Old Brooklyn News (OBN)! And going beyond that, they also answer my requests for information and let me know when I didn't get something quite right.

In January's history article, the sixth month in which I've discussed the Bohemian influence in Cleveland, I began writing about the Roman Catholic parishes which were established for Czechs. I started with the first one, St. Wenceslaus, but didn't get very far into its history because St. Procop was founded so soon afterwards; since St. Procop was located in an area of the original Brooklyn Township which is so geographically close to today's Old Brooklyn, I finished its story first.

I subsequently received a succession of emails from John Sabol, one of the co-authors of Arcadia Publishing's book, Cleveland Czechs (2009). John pointed out that the photo in the January OBN of St. Wenceslaus was actually a photo of St. Wenceslaus' second church building and that it was located at a different "Little Bohemia" address (Broadway Ave. and E. 37th St.) than the first church was.

But even if St. Wenceslaus hadn't moved "down the street", our address in the photo caption would still have been incorrect, because we didn't catch a "typo" which stated that it was located at Arch St. and E. 35th St.; the first church building according to the Diocese of Cleveland history book I'd consulted -- and as stated in the article itself -- was at Arch St. and Burwell Ave./E. 35th Place.

However, the online Rootsweb Cleveland street names source lists E. 35th Place as the new name of Arch St., not Burwell St./Ave. Historical research is wrought with the possibility of error and wondering which source to believe! The bottom line is that I regret publishing something which wasn't accurate and hope that no one will rely on my incorrect information when writing about the same

John Sabol also sent me two articles about St. Procop Church from the Plain Dealer, one from January 28, 1884, and the other from January 5, 1885. Both describe in much greater detail what I summed up in last month's article with the simple statement, "When Father Koudelka was transferred to St. Louis in 1882... the people at St. Procop would not accept any new priest as their pastor. As a result, the bishop of Cleveland closed St. Procop from February, 1884 until July,


The occurrences recounted in those two Plain Dealer articles are like tales from the "Wild West", and make any current-day protests over church closings seem very tame by comparison. It is also interesting to note that the parish's name was spelled Prokop in those days.

Now getting back to the history of St. Wenceslaus, the "mother church" of all Bohemian/Czech parishes in Cleveland --

In addition to the frame church which had been erected in 1867, between 1870 and 1872 a house next to the church was purchased for use as a rectory, and a two-grade parochial school opened. As mentioned last month, in 1875, Father Antonin (Anthony) Hynek, who had been the pastor of both St. Procop and St. Wenceslaus for two years, was relieved of his duties at St. Procop. He then served solely as the pastor of St. Wenceslaus until his death in

The Catholic Bohemian population in Cleveland was growing so quickly, however, that by 1886 it was obvious that the St. Wenceslaus congregation needed a bigger church. Therefore, land was purchased at Broadway Ave. and E. 37th St. for the second

Wenceslaus church (building). The cornerstone was laid in June, 1892, and twentyfour Bohemian societies, led by twelve bands from various parishes, paraded through the neighboring streets in celebration of the event. The new church started being

used the same year, though it wasn't actually finished until 1899.

In the early 1920s, the smoke and smog from the steel mills in the industrial valley below Broadway was causing many of the Bohemians/Czechs to move to Maple Heights. A "mission church" of St. Wenceslaus was founded on Libby Rd. there in 1923.

At first services were conducted at both the mission church in Maple Heights and the second church on Broadway Ave. In 1924 a decision was made to establish the Maple Heights church as a separate parish. It, too, was called St. Wenceslaus; I will talk more about it next month.

Attendance at the Broadway St. Wenceslaus continued to dwindle, though, and Ohio's plan to construct I-77 was the city parish's final blow. The last Mass was celebrated on June 9, 1963 and the church buildings were demolished the following month in anticipation of the freeway construction.

When the Broadway St. Wenceslaus closed, though, the Czech people still in that neighborhood weren't left without a nationality parish to attend. In 1882, Father Hynek had purchased property for another Bohemian church at the corner of Hamm Ave. (just south of Broadway Ave.) and Randolph St. (E. 54th St.) The man who was to be its first pastor, Father Stefan/Stephan (Stephen) Furdek, had been recruited in Prague to serve Cleveland's Slovak and Bohemian Catholics while he was still in the seminary. He came to Cleveland, finished his studies and was ordained here.

Father Furdek's first assignment was at St. Wenceslaus, but in May, 1883, after less than a year there, he was given the responsibility of founding the new parish. Having visited Lourdes, France, on the way to America, he named it Our Lady of Lourdes. The church faces E. 55th St., which was called Willson Ave. prior to 1906. (The mailing address is on E. 53rd St., though, which is what the front of the rectory faces).


Our Lady of Lourdes' first church and school, administered by the Sisters of Notre Dame, opened that same year But the large number of new immigrants settling in the area necessitated breaking ground for the current church in the spring of 1891.

That same year, Our Lady of Lourdes

School, with 525 students, had the notoriety of being the sixth largest parochial school in the Diocese of Cleveland.

The construction of the current Our Lady of Lourdes church building was completed in 1902. The structure was designed by the same architect who drew up the plans for St. Michael

The Lourdes campus expanded again in 1906, when a new 16-room school was built.

For a short time Father Furdek was assigned to St. Procop Church, one of the Czech parishes discussed last month. But the parishioners at Lourdes demanded his return! He subsequently returned to be the pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes until his death in January, 1915. The fact that an estimated 10,000-plus people came to his funeral -obviously far more standing outside in the cold than could be accommodated in the church -- is testimony to the peoples' high regard for this man.

Father Joseph Koudelka, mentioned last month in the segment about St. Procop's, by this point in time had become Bishop Koudelka of Wisconsin, and he was among the mourners at Father Furdek's funeral.

Although Father Furdek was the pastor of a Bohemian/Czech parish, he was also deeply involved with the Slovak community, both in Cleveland and across the nation. In 1890, in Cleveland, he founded the First Catholic Slovak Union (FCSU), a fraternal insurance organization which provided for the widows, children and orphans of American and Canadian laborers in the steel mills, salt mines and coal mines who were killed in the line of work. It was the second Slovak fraternal insurance organization in America, and currently is the largest Slovak insurance company in the

The following year, Father Furdek became the founder and publisher of the FCSU's weekly bi-lingual newspaper, Jednota (Union/Fraternity).

One year later, also in Cleveland, Father Furdek helped the Slovak women organize their own fraternal insurance organization, the First Catholic Slovak Ladies Union/now called the First Catholic Slovak Ladies Association. This group publishes a monthly magazine called Zenska Jednota (Fraternally

In 1907, Father Furdek became the first president of the Slovak League of America, which was also founded in Cleveland.

Father (later Monsignor) Oldrich Zlamal was assigned to be the second pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes Church. During his tenure, the school gymnasium (1922), the convent (1926) and the rectory (1927) were built. Ninth grade classes were added to the school in 1939. In the spring of 1948, the first class graduated from Our Lady of Lourdes High

Our Lady of Lourdes High School was merged into the multi-campus Cleveland Central Catholic High School in 1961. Due to the demographic changes in the area and the resultant dwindling parish census, the Lourdes segment of the high school campus closed in the mid-1980s.

In 1995, Our Lady of Lourdes Elementary School closed. Today the building is leased to a charter school called Hope Academy. The parish still enjoys use of the facility for certain activities, and the Lourdes alums from both the grade school and the high school sponsor an annual Christmas party (though not on the grounds of their former

For several years, Our Lady of Lourdes Church was kept together (similar to how St. Procop was) by co-parish life coordinators and the priests who came there to offer the weekend liturgies. Then, during the Vibrant Parish Life initiative and subsequent clustering process, the Diocese of Cleveland determined that the parish would remain open and minister to the Czech (and neighborhood) as well as to the Hispanic communities.

In July, 2009, Our Lady of Lourdes regained "resident pastor status" when Father Joseph Callahan, a former Diocesan missionary in El Salvador -- and therefore a priest fluent in Spanish -- was appointed there.

In addition to the new St. Wenceslaus in Maple Heights, there were still three other parishes established for Catholic Bohemians in Cleveland - St. Adalbert on E. 83rd St., St. John Nepomucene on Fleet Ave., and Holy Family on E. 131st St. And Broadway Methodist Church was established in the same neighborhood. We'll conclude this series next month by talking about each of them.

Acropolis Restaurant, 6021 Memphis Ave, is an open and updated restaurant with a nicely decorated party room/bar area. Jim K. Souris and Nicky Souris opened Acropolis on July 1, 2011.

Jim was born in Greece and most of his family still resides there. He is an electrical engineer by trade and has a passion for cooking. He and his sister owned a successful restaurant in Greece and many items served at Acropolis Restaurant -- e.g., Eggplant Moussaka, Pastichio (Greek lasagna) and Souvlaki (yeal, pork or chicken shish kabobs) -- were also served there. He said that everything served at Acropolis is home-made from scratch.

A recipe for a traditional Greek soup served at Acropolis is below; it is the "soup of the day" at the restaurant on Thursdays and Saturdays.

## "Avgolemono" (egg & lemon chicken soup)

**Ingredients:** 

Whole chicken

3 eggs

8 cups chicken stock

1 - 2 freshly squeezed lemons 1/2 cup uncooked long grain rice salt & pepper to taste

#### **Directions:**

- •Cover whole chicken with chicken stock -- in a large soup pot. (use more if needed)
- •Add salt and pepper.
- •Bring to a boil and simmer for 30 minutes
- (or until chicken is cooked through).
- •Remove chicken and let cool. •Add rice and cook for 30 minutes (or until
- rice is soft).
- •Beat eggs and lemon juice until very creamy.
- Pour egg mixture into soup very slowly, stirring constantly. (Take care NOT to scramble the eggs).
- •Pull chicken meat off the bones and add to rice mixture. Serve hot.


