Second annual jazz festival to be held at Riverside Cemetery this month

Riverside Cemetery, 3607 Pearl Rd., will host a Latin Jazz Fest from 2 to 4 p.m. on Sunday, July 22nd. This year the music of Roberto Ocasio will be featured; two ensembles, Ernie Krivda and Rey Cintron Latin Jazz, will be performing. The Roberto Ocasio Foundation is co-sponsor of this event.

Roberto Ocasio is one of the jazz greats who rest eternally at Riverside Cemetery. (Others include Robert Lockwood, Jr., and Robert "Skeets" Ross. Many of Greater Cleveland's notable industrialists, land developers, political and cultural forefathers rest eternally at Riverside, too.)

The Roberto Ocasio Foundation was established in 2004 to perpetuate Roberto Ocasio's music and to further his efforts on behalf of music education, diversity and young people's achievements. The Foundation schedules events and educational clinics, lecture and demonstrations throughout the year in honor of Roberto as well as presenting the annual Roberto Ocasio Latin Jazz Music Camp.

Ernie Krivda is in his sixth decade on the music scene "on the move" following ten years of intense activity, achievement and recognition. In a career that spans almost fifty years, Krivda entered this decade with the respect of his peers and the accolades of critics who have called him one of the greatest jazz tenor saxophonists in the world.

Ernie's very personal and distinctive improvisational style, along with his unique compositions, has been documented on thirty recordings under his name and many others as a guest artist.

Rey Cintron, a native Clevelander of

Puerto Rican descent, was raised in Puerto Rico by his grandmother. As a young adult,

Rey returned to the United States, living in New York City and studying music, specializing in drums and percussion, at the Boys Harbor Conservatory and East Harlem Music School where he also taught.

In New York, he played with the big names in Latin music, including the Johnny Colon Orchestra and the Charlie Palmieri band, before returning to Cleveland and playing and recording with Roberto Ocasio's Latin Jazz Project in the mid-90s and again since 2000.

Riverside Cemetery is a wonderful cultural symbol located in the Brooklyn Centre neighborhood of Cleveland. Dedicated in April, 1876, Riverside Cemetery was initially a 102.5 acre farm belonging to Titus Brainard; the farm land was acquired originally by his grandfather, Asa Brainard, when he came here from Connecticut in 1814 (Connecticut's "Western Reserve").

The high land overlooked the Cuyahoga River and a valley of farms bordering it, which suggested the name Riverside. This was the establishment of the first major-sized cemetery association on the west side of the Cuyahoga River.

In November 1876, a dedication ceremony occurred with Governor and President-elect Rutherford B. Hayes participating. The Administration Building (1896) and the Stone Chapel (1876) are nationally registered buildings.

This year's GardenWalk to include Old Brooklyn and Brooklyn Centre

Brooklyn Centre and Old Brooklyn are two of the neighborhoods featured on this year's *GardenWalk Cleveland*. The *GardenWalk*, a free, self-guided tour of gardens, urban farms, vineyards and orchards in ten Cleveland neighborhoods, will take place on Saturday, July 21st, and Sunday, July 22nd, from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

As well as being featured stops, Art House, 3119 Denison Ave., (with its newly planted herb and dye garden) and the Ben Franklin Community Garden, 1929 Spring Rd., will serve as headquarters on the days of the event.

In Brooklyn Centre, Riverside Cemetery and eighteen private gardens, as well as three "Reimagining Cleveland" sites -- the Brooklyn Centre Community Orchard, the W. 36th St. Commons/AZK Polar Plot and "A Forest Trail in the City", will be on the tour.

South of the Brooklyn -Brighton Bridge, Vintage Alpacas Farm on E. Schaaf Rd., Old Brooklyn Greenhouse on W. 11th St. and two nature preserves join other beautifully groomed private gardens which showcase the creativity in the local gardening community.

Many of the gardeners who've put their homes on the tour are part of the Brooklyn Centre Naturalists' effort to make the area a National Wildlife Federation Wildlife Community. They'll be sharing tips about how to attract birds and butterflies to gardens and how easy it is to gain certification.

Four other events will also be taking place during the weekend --

Saturday, July 21st

From 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. the Cleveland

Public Library-Brooklyn Branch, 3706 Pearl Rd., will host the opening of a (Brooklyn) bicentennial photo display. It will show images of Brooklyn Centre from its historic beginnings to the Cleveland park neighborhood it is today. The power point slide show is a collaboration between Cleveland Public Library and the Denison Horizon Science Academy Newspaper Club. It will be open throughout the summer for people visiting the library.

Meanwhile, The Fulton Branch of the Cleveland Public Library, 3545 Fulton Rd., will exhibit a series of historic maps showing how boundaries, growth and highways have changed this community.

From 1 to 3 p.m., Art House will hold one of its Family Open Studios.

Participants will make garden stepping stones -- one to take home and one to add to the butterfly garden at Art House.

From 2 to 8 p.m., Cleveland Metroparks will again be presenting *Brookstock* in Brookside Reservation. Music, food, crafts and children's games are among the activities which will be awaiting whoever attends this yearly summer festival.

Sunday, July 22nd

Riverside Cemetery, 3607 Pearl Rd., will host a Latin Jazz Fest from 2 to 4 p.m. This year the music of Roberto Ocasio will be featured. There will be two ensembles performing Latin Jazz selections. The Roberto Ocasio Foundation is a co-sponsor of this event. Short tours of the cemetery by horse and carriage will be available for attendees.

All in all, the weekend of July 21st and 22nd should provide a lot of fun and excitement for residents and visitors to Brooklyn Centre and Old Brooklyn.

Dina's Pizza & Pub (The Filling Station)

Dina Walsh opened her first pizza shop in 1985 when she was 19 on Fulton Rd. (across from St. Rocco's). After a few years of running her own business, she ran a carry out/delivery business out of her father's establishment, Cuffari's Go-Kart Track. She also sold pizza to Fagan's in the Flats on their patio during the summer months.

In 1994, Dina opened Dina's Pizza & Pub on Pearl Rd. Unfortunately, this location caught fire in 1999 during a lightning storm and had to be demolished.

Dina's current location at 5701 Memphis Ave. opened on September 18th, 2000; she employs over 60 local residents. "We've had employees with us since 1986, and they are like family," Dina said with a smile.

When asked why she rebuilt Dina's Pizza & Pub in Old Brooklyn after the fire, Dina replied, "Our Old Brooklyn customers were calling us around the clock, asking when we were re-opening. Our employees live here; our family lives here. Old Brooklyn has truly good, loyal people and we don't want to be anywhere else."

She added that, "Many of my customers travel to Old Brooklyn and try to convince me to open another location closer to them. Although the thought of a second location has crossed my mind, I would never want to leave Old Brooklyn....There are some great, loyal people in this community!"

Dina was born and raised in Old Brooklyn and lived in Old Brooklyn for most of her adult life. She recently moved to Parma with her children Tommy, 19, and Lea 16. Lea is a senior in high school and is very involved in sports. Although she does not currently work for Dina's because of her studies and involvement in sports, she and her girlfriends certainly enjoy the benefits of her mothers being in the restaurant business. They frequently hang out & enjoy the great food.

Dina's son Tommy is going to college and works at Dina's Pizza & Pub with the goal of someday taking over the business. In the meantime he is studying to be a fire fighter and hopes to serve the community.

Dina's dough and sauces are all home-made and made fresh daily. The restaurant also gets food delivered fresh daily.

Dina's is open 365 days a year and delivers to households and businesses throughout the Old Brooklyn area. They open daily at 11 a.m. for lunch and have great daily specials. Dina's Pizza & Pub is located can be reached at 216-351-3663.

The recipe below is often served at Dina's Pizza & Pub and is a crowd favorite.

Italian Wedding Soup

Ingredients:

- 1# Italian wedding soup meat balls (very small meatballs)
- 8 oz Acini De Pepe pasta
- 1- 16 oz. can chicken broth
- handful of fresh chopped spinach
- 1# cooked boneless, skinless chicken breast
- 32 oz. water
- 4 oz. chicken base
- 2 oz. minced garlic
- 4 oz. chopped onions
- 1 Tbsp. black pepper
- 2 Tbsp. parsley flakes

Instructions:

1. Set aside meatballs and pasta.
2. Combine other ingredients in a stock pot on stove and simmer for about a half hour until boiling.
3. Add meatballs to boiling water and let them rise to the top.
4. Add Acini De Pepe pasta and continue boiling for 20 minutes. Serves: 6 - 8

Ben Franklin volunteers support Garden and Greater Cleveland community as well

The Benjamin Franklin Community Garden depends on volunteers to operate the Garden and support events and projects in the Old Brooklyn community. This season a formalized volunteer program, captained by Garden Coordinator T.J. Oryshkewych or a member of the Garden Committee, has organized gardeners into task-oriented crews.

"The Garden Committee encourages each gardener to contribute at least five hours of volunteer service each season," explained John Jenkins, chairman of the Garden Committee. "The formalized volunteer program, proposed by 2011 Garden Coordinator Carol Stadden and launched on a pilot basis for the 2012 season, makes it easy for gardeners to schedule volunteer time and accomplish what needs to be done to keep the Garden looking great. The volunteers also help make improvements for future seasons, and support our community outreach efforts," he added.

Some crews have completed their assignment(s); others are hard at work or will undertake projects later in the season. For example, the Garden Set-up crew completed its task in May, prepping name boards and measuring and staking the plots in time for opening day.

Throughout the season other crews host social and fundraising events; maintain the grounds, buildings and equipment; plant, weed and harvest hunger center plots; beautify common areas; monitor garden plots; and prepare compost.

On Thursday, July 12th, members of the Social/Fundraising Events crew will help host the Garden's annual Ice Cream Social. This crew also will organize the Harvest Picnic on Saturday, September 8th.

After harvesting begins, members of the Hunger Center Delivery crew take surplus produce on a daily or near daily basis to local hunger centers. Approximately half a dozen organizations benefit from produce donated by Ben Franklin gardeners or grown in designated hunger center plots. In October, the Garden Closing Crew will prepare the Garden for plowing and ensure that the structures, tools and equipment are ready for winter.



Joe remains very active. He was recognized for being at the opening of the original Fulton Road Bridge in 1932 and its reopening in 2010.

Joe participates in *Right to Life* events and parades. He just finished writing a book about his involvement in the *Divine Mercy* called, *The Son Reigns on my parade ... all the time*.

Mr. Cannon is a life time member of Mary Queen of Peace (formerly Our Lady of Good Counsel) Church in the Old Brooklyn neighborhood. He is truly a devoted individual.

Kate Dupuis was born in Cleveland on the near west side. Kate is a designated "master glass painter" and served part of her apprenticeship at Canterbury Cathedral in England.

Kate owns Rainey Dupuis Studio which has been designing, fabricating and restoring stained glass windows for thirty years. The studio's most recent installation can be seen at the Hospice of the Western Reserve's Westlake office.

Ms. Dupuis is very involved with the Stockyards, Clark-Fulton and Brooklyn Centre community development corporation's office. She helped form and currently and serves as chair person of the Housing Committee. Kate also contributes to the community development office by; representing Clark-Fulton on the Advisory Board, chairing the Hispanic Outreach Committee, and participating on the Safety Committee.

Kate is very active in Democratic politics.

She is president of the Ward Club, a member of the Executive Committee and serves as a precinct committee person.

Kate started *Cans for Cats*, a small trap neuter return program to help address the plight of feral cats. She raises funds by collecting cans and turning them in for recycling. The money she receives from collecting the cans goes to help pay for spaying and neutering of cats.

Summer is moving right along, sometimes too hot and sometimes surprisingly chilly, and almost too dry. But the evenings have been perfect for many of the events taking place in our neighborhood last month...

See the photo and caption on page 6 to check out how wonderfully the **Party on the Piazza** turned out for **Mary Queen of Peace Church**. (It poured rain the following day.)

And **Old Brooklyn Community Development Corporation (OBCDC)** had a perfect evening a week ago for the movie they screened for **Councilman Kevin Kelley in Loew Park**. The temperatures were tending toward cool, the mosquitoes weren't biting, and the **Dolphin Tales**, was as touching as a film could be. So many people showed up that OBCDC ran out of the bags of complimentary popcorn, and the **Historical Society of Old Brooklyn (HSOB)** ran out of the chocolate bars it was selling, too.

Since the **next movie**, on August 17th at **Brookside Reservation**, will be in combination with a potluck supper, there're probably won't be any bags of popcorn to worry about getting/not getting, but the HSOB has vowed to bring a larger supply of chocolate bars.

While working in my yard on other summer days and evenings, it occurred to me that the *Old Brooklyn News* hadn't received a notice this year about residents being able to get **mulch**, made from **discarded Christmas trees**, at **Rosby Resource Recovery, Inc.** on E. Schaaf Rd. So I called to inquire about it.

Apparently they didn't have enough mulch this year to give any away (though people could still buy it). Darn! In the past, I always intended to get some, but then never got there before it was gone. Now it sounds like it's a program which won't be continued.

I very much appreciate the many favorable comments I received in response to my article about the **Jesse Owens tree at James**

Ford Rhodes High School in last month's paper. One of them was from a man familiar with the area from his own track experience. Here's what **Richard Nadson**, a Music and Computer Teacher at our neighborhood **St. Mary Byzantine Catholic School**, wrote --

I just read and enjoyed your article on the Jesse Owens Oak Tree at Rhodes. I grew up in Brooklyn in the 1960s and our track team at Rhodes during the winter. We were well aware of the Oak and knew that it was the only remaining tree from Jesse Owens and the 1936 Olympics.

The story we were told back in the 60s was that the other three trees were at his mother's house in Cleveland, East Tech where he went to high school and Ohio State. The other three trees were vandalized. The remaining tree at Rhodes was not publicized or marked with a plaque because of the fear that it, too, would be vandalized.

Jesse chose Rhodes because most of the district and regional track meets were there and that's where he had his earliest success as a runner. I don't know how true this version of the story is, but it has been around for at least 50 years.

Thanks for writing, Rick. We very much enjoy receiving this kind of feedback to share with other readers.

A bit of the Czech story is continued this-month, too. In the article in March, 2012, I mentioned one of the Czech fraternal organizations, **Karlin Hall**, which for many decades was located on Fleet Ave. near E. 53rd St. in Slavic Village. As that article stated, Karlin Hall closed in June, 2010.

I recently learned, when I was treated to a traditional Czech pork and bread dumpling dinner, that on Wednesday nights, much of the former Karlin Hall crowd has "relocated" to Old Brooklyn's (lower) **Ampol Hall**, 4737 Pearl Rd. That very much surprised me, since Ampol is short for American-Polish, and I didn't picture ethnic groups other than the Poles meeting there.

Duck, sauerkraut and dumpling dinners are available, too. And dancing to a live band to Eastern European style music starts after dinner. Dinners must be reserved a few days in advance. Call 216-581-4362 to do so.

(Apparently it's not uncommon for different ethnic groups to support each other these

days. I also recently learned that the **German Central Organization** rents its entire three-building facility and grounds -- on York Rd. in Parma -- to the **Hungarians** for their **annual festival** during the three days of Labor Day weekend.)

Talking about ethnicity leads right into my next topic -- what's happening in terms of reopening **St. Barbara's**, our neighborhood Polish parish on Denison Ave. At press time, **Christine Dzedzina**, the woman who'd written about the initial meeting with Bishop Lennon in last month's paper, called to tell me the latest development -- that Fr. Joseph Hilinski has been named the new pastor and

that the reopened parish will celebrate its first Mass at 11 a.m. on Sunday, July 22nd.

Parishioners have been told that the statues of St. Barbara and Mary which had been placed in St. John Cantius on College Ave. in Tremont, the "mother" church of St. Barbara, and the others which had been in storage for safekeeping at Henninger's, have been returned to the church. No one has been back inside yet to see them.

As I see it...

Dear Family & Friends:

There's a legend among the Cheyenne about a village near a forest. For years the adult villagers practiced a routine where they'd sneak off to a path through the forest that led to a stream. Once there, they would walk on a well-worn log that was over the stream. When certain that no one was looking, the Indian would look into the water and, seeing his reflection, would begin sharing his deepest thoughts and concerns aloud. Doing this made him feel good. Though all the adults were aware it was common practice, they never spoke of it to each other.

One day two Cheyenne children stumbled upon the path and came upon the stream and log. There, in the water, they saw their reflections. Before long they were talking to the stream, telling of things within their hearts. And it made them feel good.

Running back to the village, they told the adults about their discovery and what they had done; however, the adults felt threatened. They took up stones and chased the children away.

According to the Cheyenne, the meaning of this legend is that everyone needs to talk to someone. But since it can be considered a weakness, you don't dare tell anyone. Business Help

Recently the Old Brooklyn Community Development Corporation (OBCDC) met with Steve Millard and Megan Kim from the Council of Smaller Enterprises (COSE) to discuss a business development project for Old Brooklyn. There will be more about that project in a future article. Steve is the long-term Executive Director and Megan is the Director of Education and Programs. They are a dynamic business duo which quietly builds small business success throughout northeast Ohio. COSE is a membership-based professional organization (non-profit) whose "... mission is to serve, advocate and lead on behalf of the small business community."

Supported by a staff of 60 people, COSE represents approximately 14,000 business members. Its range of services allows small businesses to jointly purchase health, dental and vision insurance at large group rates that no individual company could get on its own.

COSE has experts in Ohio Workmen's Compensation laws and regulations. Anyone who operates a small business knows that an employee claim can result in sudden rate increases that can ruin a company. COSE management assists companies dealing with claims and has been known to save a small company from closing because of a legitimate claim.

Large companies have lobbyists or belong to national organizations that have lobbyists tracking state and national laws that have dramatic impact on small business. COSE offers similar monitoring and advocacy assistance for small businesses. Sales tax, corporate tax, income tax and property taxes all have bottom line implications for small business. Then there is licensing, operating regulations and continu-

ing education requirements specific to all different types of businesses that must be followed. No small business owner can possibly keep up with ever changing taxes and regulations. For the price of a membership, COSE tracks these many business-related issues and keeps the membership informed.

COSE staff does not set policy; that is done by a twenty-nine member board. The staff serves the common interests of the members through research, polling, communications, seminars, continuing education, joint purchasing programs, field visits, insurance administration and advocacy. Staff members are liaisons to many other organizations and state and local governments. Their role is to listen, learn, respond and promote issues and opportunities that grow business in northeast Ohio.

The founding of COSE began in a transportation crisis in April of 1970 when 10,000 Ohio truck drivers went on strike. Although the strike was not a labor action against small businesses, it stopped the flow of products to and from businesses. That in turn forced companies to cut production and lay off employees.

When local business operator Bill Jones issued a call to action among small business he quickly had responses from two hundred business operators. This became the short-lived Industrial Action Committee. When the strike ended and deliveries resumed the group lost it drive but the leaders saw the need for a professional affiliation that concentrates on small business issues. Two year later COSE was launched. It has grown into a large but flexible organization focused upon building and sustaining business in northeast Ohio.

OBCDC Help

OBCDC is also a member of a professional trade association. Cleveland Neighborhood Development Corporation (CNDC) is a non-profit organization whose members are the approximately 27 community development organizations throughout Cleveland and other organizations or businesses that encompass community development.

Community development corporations offer a wide range of services including neighborhood based economic development, residential restoration and construction, home repair, community outreach, block club sup-

port, building code assistance, job training, educational assistance, crime prevention and community gardens.

CNDC is the support group that focuses on the city-wide resources for all these specialized services in the neighborhoods. It offers advocacy and policy research that supports the missions of its individual members. It is often

called upon by members of the Mayor's cabinet or City Council to provide perspective and insight on the many services community development organizations offer.

OBCDC participates in several of the committees that CNDC facilitates including the Executive Directors Forum, the Economic Development Committee (commercial managers), Community Organizers Committee and the Housing Committee.

CNDC is the voice of all the community development organizations in Cleveland.

Free yard help for seniors

Old Brooklyn CDC can now offer senior and disabled homeowners free help with light yard work by a local high school student through the Workforce Exploration Program. The Workforce Exploration Program employs responsible, low income students and is administered by Cuyahoga Community College.

OBCDC's Yard Help Program offers assistance with lawn mowing to residents of the Old Brooklyn CDC service area who meet the criteria and require assistance with lawn mowing and basic yard work (weeding, clean up, etc.). In order to be considered for the program, an applicant must:

- Reside in the Old Brooklyn CDC service area.

- Own the home where they reside.
- Pass a basic criminal background check (for the safety of volunteer worker).
- Everyone living in the home is at least 62 years old or disabled (except children).

The student can also assist senior and disabled persons who need help with their garden plot at Benjamin Franklin Community Garden. The student worker will have an official OBCDC badge and will not ask for any compensation. The homeowner or gardener must be present when the yard work is being completed.

Please note that the student is not a professional landscaper and the help being offered will not be professional quality. The student worker will be available through August 2, 2012, which is when the Workforce Exploration Program ends.

2012 Cleveland tree assistance program for seniors


The Cleveland Department of Aging in partnership with the Department of Public Works and the Department of Community Development has a new short term program to help seniors with limited incomes with hazardous tree and branch removal on their personal property.

To qualify one must be a low income Cleveland senior homeowner or an adult 18-59 with a disability (annual income of \$17,850 or less for 2 person household; \$15,610 for 1 person household). He or she must also reside in and own a single or two-family home and the tree of concern must be on the applicant's property.

City Fresh is great deal for families of all incomes

City Fresh provides locally grown food to residents in urban areas and the program returned to Old Brooklyn for the 2012 season. City Fresh has two share sizes- family shares and single shares.

A \$28 family share will feed three - four people; shareholders who meet the low income WIC guidelines pay \$16. A \$15 single share is good for one - two people; low-income shareholders pay \$9.

To meet the low income guidelines, households with one person must earn \$20,148 or less annually; \$41,348 for a family of four. The Ohio Electronic Benefits Transfer or EBT card is accepted.

Share bags will change from week to

week depending upon what has been harvested. The following is a sample single share bag from July 2011: 1 onion, 1 cabbage, 1 head romaine lettuce, 1/2 pound green beans, 2 yellow squash, 1/2 pound, pickling cucumbers, 1 zucchini, 1 bunch kohlrabi, 1 bulb of garlic, 1 eggplant, and 4 lodi apples.

Ethnic groups establish Cultural Gardens in Cleveland's Rockefeller Park

An interesting sidebar to the articles we've been running about Cleveland's ethnic groups and the churches and fraternal organizations they've established is the story of the Cleveland Cultural Gardens. At one time the pride of the nationalities which developed them, they fell into disrepair as the neighborhood in which they were located deteriorated.

Happily, over the past fifteen or twenty years, the Gardens have been enjoying a resurgence in caring and popularity. New gardens continue to be established by more recent immigrant groups, and emails I regularly receive from folks affiliated with the Rusins and Poles notify people about clean-up, wreath-laying, etc. events at their respective Gardens. In addition, wedding parties often visit one of the Gardens for photo shoots between the ceremony and the reception.

The Cultural Gardens are located in Rockefeller Park, between East Blvd. and Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd. (originally Lower East Blvd. and later -- and more recently -- Liberty Blvd.) The majority of the Gardens are between Superior Ave. and St. Clair Ave., but one is north of Superior and three are south of St. Clair. Some of them face

only one of the thoroughfares, and others can be accessed from both sides. Doan Creek meanders through Rockefeller Park and can be seen from many of the Gardens.

Rockefeller Park is named after John D.

and Laura Spellman Rockefeller, who deeded the 270 acre plot of land to the City of Cleveland in 1897. No doubt a separate article could be written about all the delightful amenities it afforded Clevelanders of that day.

The Cultural Gardens were dedicated on

July 30th, 1939, and the *Encyclopedia of Cleveland History's* entry about Rockefeller Park states that over 35,000 people were in attendance for it. But the earliest formal nationality gardens were already being developed well before 1939.

Other than the City of Cleveland's Greenhouse, which was built in 1905 in the northern part of Rockefeller Park, the first landscaped garden to go into Rockefeller Park was the Shakespeare Garden in 1916. That garden gave Cleveland newspaperman Leo Weidental the idea for establishing a similar site for each of the city's nationality communities. The organization he founded in 1925 to accomplish that goal was called the Civic Progress League. The following year, its name was changed to the Cultural Garden League.

The Hebrew Garden was the first one established, in 1926. The German Garden followed in 1929, the Italian Garden in 1930, the Slovak and Yugoslav (now called Slovenian) Gardens in 1932, and the Hungarian and Polish Gardens in 1934.

(The above dates are from the www.culturalgardens.org website. The *Encyclopedia of Cleveland History* lists slightly different dates and order of being established.)

I wasn't around for the original glory years of the Cultural Gardens, but I definitely

remember the Sixties and Seventies when the Gardens had become so severely vandalized that a person would have to have been either crazy or terribly naive to have wandered through such an unsafe segment of the city. That began to change in the mid-Eighties when Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd. was restructured; revitalizing the Gardens was part of the plan.

In Memoriam -- Clarence M. Easterwood

Sometimes persons come into one's life, and it's hard to remember exactly when they first appeared, and how it happened that they stayed. Such was the case with Clarence Easterwood, who, an unknown number of years ago, became a "regular" at the Old Brooklyn Community Development Corporation's office. Was it because he was a gardener at Ben Franklin? Was it because he regularly advertised for old fishing tackle, rods, reels and lures in the *Old Brooklyn News* classifieds? Was it because he liked to eat at Arby's and hang out at Ameriflag, both of which were near our office? Was it because he worked tending the grounds at Kiddie Park for 18 years, and was there when we featured the Park in a long article? Or was it because he liked to make chili and share big containers of it with us, sometimes for no reason and sometimes for staff parties? Whatever the original circumstances were, the bottom line is that Clarence, the tall guy with the light-colored hat in the above picture, endeared himself to us, and now he is no longer here. After successfully fighting cancer a few years ago, Clarence became ill with a new malady, and died at the age of 89 on Tuesday, May 15th, at Fairview Hospital. He was cremated shortly thereafter, and on Friday, June 8th, a service was held for him at the Ohio Western Reserve National Cemetery (forveterans) in Rittman, Ohio. Approximately a dozen people with Old Brooklyn business connections attended the military ceremony and interment of his remains in the mausoleum. (Lynette Filips wrote Clarence's obituary.)


