

According to the Ohio Education Association, hundreds of thousands of jobs in the teaching profession are open .... particularly in elementary teaching. Elementary enrollment is increasing rapidly due to the rising birth rate and the "war babies." An estimated 3,000,000 additional children will enter public schools during the next five years. In the next five years 500,000 new elementary teachers will be needed in America's schools...during the next ten years 1,000,000 new teachers will be needed.

Teachers' salaries are on the increase. Parents are demanding that their children have well-trained and well-paid teachers. Many salaries be gin at \$2400 a year and above and may reach \$5000-\$6000 for highly trained and highly experienced teachers. Though not universal, "single salary" schedules are becoming more widespread. Such schedules call for the same pay for senior high, junior high, and elementary teachers.


Frank Ulle (Collinwood) won the 880-yard Senate title in 2 minutes 02.8 seconds.

And what loyal basketball fan will forget that tragic night at South High School gym where the previously victoryless Flyers went berserk pole vault with a vault of 9 feet. and ripped the horns off Warren Vannersdall's title-bound Rams with a Nass High Scorer; startling 54-50 triumph. 
