Attire will be formal for the girls with the boys wearing either formal wear or dark suits and ties.


Tickets for the formal are \$4 per couple and a limited amount of tickets will be sold for non Y-Teen members for \$5 per couple.

Judge Toner Lectures Classes, Relates Facts On Teens, Courts

"In the eyes of the law Rhodians are all right. The percentage of Rhodes' students who come into Juvenile Court is extremely low."

J. Toner of Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court. The Judge lectured Mr. John White's business and law classes on December 7.

The Judge's lecture encompassed the functioning and some insight into Juvenile Court.

THE COURT HAS jurisdiction over all offenses committed by minors. Authority over negligent parents, adults charged with contributing to the delinquency of minors and paternity cases is delegated to this court.

Judge Toner pointed out that Juvenile Court places emphasis on the offender rather than on the offense. The court determines the motivating forces behind actions of the offender.

"DELINQUENCY RATES are at an all time high, he said. "A good percentage of the offenders are Negroes who come from broken homes, and lower classes."

The Judge pointed out the de- before we realize it."

So said the Honorable Judge John linquency rate is up 17%. Illegitemacy, V.D., and crime rates are at an all time high.

Most offenders are returned to their parents on probation. Others are placed in private schools, such as Blossom Hill for girls and Hudson Boys' Farm. The State set up a special youth commission four years ago, with offices in 88 counties.

"NEWEPAPERS BLAST the judge if he goes easy on an offender," expressed the Judge, "People feel a good judge is one who gives the impression of beating the heck out of somebody in court. The rehabilitation of an offender," he said "is important in helping him to become a good citizen."

"We are lucky for our freedom and democracy," Judge Toner said. "We can change it by the popular vote. These are problems of every generation and will become those of youth
