All parents are invited to attend James Ford Rhodes Annual Open House on Wednesday evening, October 26.

"This Open House," states Mr. Stillinger, principal, "is the type where the entire evening will be spent in helping the parents visualize or understand what we're trying to accomplish in the classroom.'

Parents will go to the classes on their son's or daughter's daytime schedule including homeroom and lunch in the cafeteria.

THE SCHEDULE will consist of nine periods. Each period will last ten minutes plus five minutes between each to exchange classes. During free periods or study halls, parents will be permitted to visit the different parts of the building, such as the guidance offices, the library, or the dispensary.

"This kind of program," comments Mr. Stillinger, "will enable the teacher to explain the content of the course, classroom procedure, and the objective of that particular class."

ONE DISADVANTAGE of this program will be the length of time. Parents who wish to discuss a specific item with a teacher are asked to make some time other than Open House.


School Play Needs Live Goat for Prop


To add to the realism of the school play "The Tea House of the August Moon," a real live goat is needed.
